Highlights of the Thursday, 12 November, 2024 Weekly Meeting

President Nancy, welcomed all members and Guests; Janet Jordan, Rick Klunder and Kelly Bruels and Guest Speakers from 6 - School Principals who will e introduced more appropriately later in the program.

Graham Schram started the 50/50 draw, with Peter Liberati and Dave Lewis holding potential winning tickets, however neither one picked the Joker from the available cards. The pot continues to grow.





Funmaster Pallo Sahota came to the Podium with some short humourous offerings slightly relating to Teachers.

Pallo had a few more semi-groaners and received a due round of applause.

She moved on to announcements: Ivone DeMarchi – Joined - December 14, He has been a member for 46 years and Jim Steele – Birthday is on December 11. An hearty round of applause was made on their behalf.

Dave Lewis came to the Microphone and Introduced the speakers from eight Core Schools of Brantford and asked that they briefly describe how they are using the Funds received from the Kiwanis/Staples Back to School Drive in Sept 2024.

He noted that in the past 6 years, since we partnered with the Brantford Staples Store with the Back-to-School project, we have been able to pass on, over \$32,000 to the core schools of our Community to the Principals of a selected group of schools. We have been able to give them funds to address the needs of children in their schools that have the greatest need. Each year we ask the Principals to let us know at a meeting like this, how these fund are helping those students in need.



Dave then asked each Principal to stand and identify themselves and their school. Following their introductions, each school was asked to give a brief outline of the ways in which the funds they have received are being used to help their students.

Following are the comments of each of the Principals / Vice Principals in order of presentation.

James Medway VP of Bellvue Public School

James indicated that since joining Bellvue it has been experiencing a lot of growth and we have received a lot of student enrollments. We are very fortunate to have students join us from a variety of cultures, backgrounds, and experiences. I feel our community is special because we are given a unique opportunity to both learn and celebrate our rich cultural diversity of all our diverse families and students. James said this diversity leads to situations that are more prevalent now in our community.



We are seeing, chaos in the home environment that can negatively impact a child's social-emotional development in many settings." We are now using a "Shanker SelfReg" program which is a process, for enhancing self-regulation by understanding and dealing with stress. In the Self-Reg program, we consider both our responses to stress and our underlying state of energy and tension when we encounter a stress. The school has set up a "Calming" area and a "Cozy Corner" to give students under stress, a quiet, isolated area to allow them time to centre themselves and not be threatened.

• Cora Hammond Principal ~ Princess Elizabeth Public School

Cora echoed some of the same challenges as James. The children's socialemotional condition based on their home and the country they have recently emigrated from, greatly affect their ability to learn and interact with others. This is particularly difficult if English is not their 1st language.


We have spent money on key boards, mice and headphone to be used with existing Ipads. The headphones cancel-out background noise and allow the children to work at their own pace, often hear a language that they are familiar with. We have bought crafts that the younger students can use to



held with their fine motor skills and help control their frustration. We have recently obtained the Brave Buddies Program which has a unique approach to helping children with selective mutism overcome anxiety and speak publicly. It is designed to help children ages 3–12, diagnosed with selective mutism, to overcome their anxiety and speak in any setting. Brave Buddies® is offered as a multi-day intensive program twice a year, or as one-day sessions several times throughout the school year.

• Ali Cole Principal ~ Major Ballachey Public School

Ali said that they are also using the Brave Buddies Program and have the same, "social-emotional development" problems since their school has a similar student demographic. They are also faced with many older children, possibly because of Covid, who are not aware how to play and how to react socially with other children or adults. They are very anxious and unsure of themselves and have quite volatile reactions.





Katie Terpstra Principal ~ Graham Bell -Victoria Public School

Katie Has had to start in this school by creating and rebuilding a school culture that has been lost over time. From the children's perspective it was not part of the community, they didn't have morning announcements. They are in the process of rebuilding with the 7-8 grade now participating the Live announcements each morning. The students of the school are now part of the Griffon Family. Monthly, we reflect on one of the Seven Grandfather Teachings: Love, Respect, Bravery, Truth, Humility, Honesty and Wisdom. The student's scores for this school were quite low.



We are now using headphones to help the student to cut-out back ground noise and allow them to focus. This reduces behavioural problems and allow them to self regulate. The headphones also, help a great deal when we can help those where English is not their 1st language.

• Derek Cherriere ~ Centennial-Grand Woodlands School

Derek Indicated that the children's social-emotional development is present in his school as well. They have been taking steps to address it and through the fund the Kiwanis Club has supplied they are now using head phones, microphones, Lego, Educational game, calculators and several other tools. Children can no longer use phones a school.

The biggest incentive we use, is to try to be; attentive to the children's needs and to treat them with kindness and teach the children to be kind to each other.



David Mcgaghran ~ Cainsville School

David confirmed the occurrence of anxiety, instability, lack of social awareness in students in his school and indicated that they have taken similar actions that the other schools have. The new Canadian's children from other cultures and families that do not speak English are of course anxious, confused, and react spontaneously.

We have responded as well with the use of the Brave Buddy Program, have build a Learning Commons area and now have STEM programs to expand the opportunities to focus their attention.



• Anh Hoang Vice Principal ~ Central Public School

Unfortunately, Anh Hoang nor Dina Atanas could not attend the meeting today but sent us an email with a note thank for the funds they received and how they had used then. Some of the funds were used for Head phone due to the same circumstances indicated by the Principals at this meeting.

• Cheryl Bannister Principal ~ King George Elementary School

Unfortunately, Cheryl Bannister was not able to attend today as this was their Holiday Concert on this date. Cheryl did however send an email outline and some pictures with some children involved.

Following is and excerpt of her outline.

"Thank you so much for selecting our school as a recipient of "The Back-to-School Project 2024". We are so appreciative of your donation.

Our school has a new program as of this year, known as "The Skills Hub." We are working with students to build skills in various areas of the curriculum, including language, fine motor, and social skills, among many others.

Our startup funds were very limited, and your donation has allowed us to purchase many amazing items to assist our students in learning and building their skills. From your donation, we were able to purchase games and craft kits, to teach working with others and turn taking during our recess clubs, headphones to allow students better access to assistive technology for reading and writing, fine motor skills games and learning activities to promote development and conversation cards to develop and teach the skills of navigating social expectations and situations (see attached photos). Your contribution will make a significant impact on improving accessibility and providing necessary tools for success in all areas. Once again, thank you for your kindness and investment in our students and their learning. We are honoured to be the recipients of your community-based initiatives."

It must be noted that each Principal/Vice Principal thanked the Kiwanis Club of Brantford and Staples generously for our support with this program helping their schools for the benefit of the children in this community.

We also had an impromptu speaker, Kelly, Staples Divisional Sales Manager. She had joined us to listen to the response from the School's Principals and Vice Principals about the Back to School Project. When she stood to speak, she was quite emotional about thanking the members of Kiwanis and the Schools for our part I helping the children in need in our community.

Kiwanian Phil officially thanked all the speakers for their thorough explanation of the changes and adaptations required each year to accommodate new changes with each school year.


