- The member who has their ticket drawn must pick the designated card from the deck of cards. The number of cards remaining will be reduced by two cards each draw. When the winnings exceed \$200 the number of cards remaining will be reduced by four each week until a winner has been declared.
- Each draw will allow two purchased tickets to be selected at random until the potential winnings exceed \$200 at which point four tickets shall be drawn at random.

President Maureen called Pallo Sahota to the podium to introduce our guest speaker Faye Prince for today's topic.

Pallos Sahota Introduce Fay Prince as our guest Speaker indicating that Faye's back ground of creating excellent centre pieces for all of our Seasonal event, involvement with our Kindness Day Events, retired Teacher, Chess expert and, presenter of a number of topics at our Weekly programs, to keep us informed and entertained, has prepared a presentation about different ways some countries celebrate New Years Eve. Pallo asked Faye Prince to come to the Podium.

Fay Prince thanked Pallo for the introduction and welcomed everyone. Faye told

us her topic today was about, "New Years Traditions".

Faye suggested that, whether we choose to go dancing, to a party, to dinner or just stay home for a quite evening, there are many ways to ring in the New Year. On January 1st there is always coverage of how many cities and countries around the world celebrated, ringing in the new year.



In New York City, there the display is always the Ball-Drop at midnight. This tradition began on New Years Eve, 1907 by the then owner of the New York Times,

who wanted people to know of the location of the newspaper's publication site. Sometime thereafter, this area was named Time Square.

The original Ball, made of iron and wood was five feet in diameter and weighed 700 pounds. It was lit by 100 incandescent lights.

Over the years, the ball has been updated a handful of times. To honour the 100th Anniversary of the original Ball-Drop, the 2008 ball was redesigned by Waterford Crystal. The design used LED lights and a computerized lighting patterns that could produce 16.7 million colours. This ball consumed only enough electricity to power 10 Toasters, and it was only used once.

A sixth ball debuted in 2009 and is still in use today. The ball is 12 feet in diameter and weighs 11, 875 pounds. It is double the size of the 2008 ball and dropped from a 475 ft. flagpole, which remains in place all year long.





After Faye's overview, a video was played showing New Years Eve Celebration held by various countries around the world.

Following are a couple of examples of 20 celebrations shown in the video.

In **Spain**, when the clock starts to strike twelve, you have twelve seconds to eat twelve grapes. One grape, for good luck in each of the coming months. Note: chomping down 12 grapes in 12 seconds is not as easy as it seems.





In the **Philippines (Manilla)** New Year's Eve is a Fashion fiesta. It is not about Fancy high fashion clothing, It all about rocking those, polka-dots. Why polka-dots? In Filipino cultures round figures symbolize prosperity and good fortune.

Bob Saunders thanked Faye Prince for the interesting and entertaining view of other people's distinctive way of welcoming in the New Year.
