President Maureen thanked Funmaster Dave and called LG Randy MacKenzie to introduce our guest speaker.

LG Randy MacKenzie came to the podium and introduced Mike Bradley as the CAO City of Brantford and that he would be talking about "What's happening around Brantford". Randy indicated that Mike Bradley's presentation would start with more background details and asked that we give a warm welcome to him.



Mike Bradly presented a brief background saying

Born and raised in Brantford, Mike's Grandfather owned the Bradley Machine Co. and Mike worked on the farm in his youth.

He has over two decades of municipal experience, including roles at the Grand River Conservation Authority (GRCA).

Served as Commissioner of Community Development for the City of Brantford (2023–2024) and CAO for the County of Brant (2018–2022).

Mike Bradly became CAO for the City of Brantford (announced October 2024).



Mike then proceeded with details relating to what is happening in Brantford.

He outlined where we are today in Brantford.

The current estimated population of the City of Brantford in 2026 is approximately 124,578, reflecting a steady annual growth rate of about (1.72%). This is an increase from the 2021 Census, which recorded a population of (104,688). The broader Brantford Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) has a higher population, measured at (144,162) in 2021. Brantford has experienced significant growth, with a (6.2%) increase between 2016 and 2021. The city's population is projected to reach (163,000) by 2041.

The City of Brantford demonstrates strong economic resilience through a diversified industrial base, significant manufacturing investments (e.g., \$500M+ in expansions in 2025), and a growing tourism sector. Despite 2025 U.S. tariff challenges, the city is proactive, implementing a "Canada-First" procurement policy, and advancing a 2024–2031 strategy focused on business retention and expansion.

Investment & Growth: In 2024, the city saw over \$132 million in construction value, adding over 712,000 sq ft of industrial space. Ferrero Group announced a major \$445 million investment, strengthening the local manufacturing sector.

Diverse Sector Support: The Economic Development team focuses on retaining and expanding businesses in key sectors like advanced manufacturing, food/beverage processing, and warehousing.

Strategic Tourism & Culture: A new Municipal Accommodation Tax and increased sports tourism (81 events in 2024) have boosted the local economy, with high attendance at the Sanderson Centre and Farmers' Market.

Mike Bradly gave us more details about:

- Sports and entertainment Centre
- The Brantford General Hospital
- Downtown revitalization
- Reconstruction of the Lorne Bridge
- Affordable Housing development
- Homelessness




And several other topics and Projects

Mike Bradly then spoke about:

Long-Term Planning: The "[Brantford 2050: Our Path Forward](#)" initiative which focuses on sustainable growth, investing in infrastructure, and developing affordable housing to ensure long-term stability.

Mike then spoke in some details about the plan for the future of Brantford.

The Brantford 2050 City Vision builds upon a strong foundation of advanced planning policies, strategies, and programs already adopted and underway. It does not mark a starting point, but rather the next step in our community's ongoing journey toward a more vibrant, connected, and sustainable future. This long-term vision provides the framework to guide consistent decision-making, priority setting, and collaboration. Over the next 25 years, Brantford will experience rapid growth, and significant economic, social and demographic changes. Some of these trends are predictable, while others will be impacted by unforeseen technological, political, economic and environmental factors.



The Brantford 2050 City Vision is based on community feedback about our collective hopes and aspirations for the future. A vision is a call to action, and motivates us to think beyond the day-to-day, signals our ambitions to other levels of government, and can help long-term decision-making.

Mike Bradly thanked everyone for their attention and lead straight into a series of Questions and answers.

After some pointed and stimulating questions, Mike Bradly was thanked on behalf of the Club by Phil Hoekstra noting that, in recognition of his presentation, we have made a donation to a Charity we like to support. That charity is the Lansdowne Children's Centre Foundation.

Mike Bradley was given a sound round of applause for his very informative, detailed and candid presentation.
