

Happy New Year everyone! I hope your holidays were perfect. Our Pacific Northwest Mid-Winter Conference is just around the corner. We will be meeting at the Best Western Plus Hood River Inn in Hood River, Oregon this year. This is a beautiful location, right on the Columbia River in the Columbia River gorge.

The cost for Kiwanians to register is \$195 and includes Friday and Saturday dinners and Saturday and Sunday breakfasts. If you are bringing a non-Kiwanian guest, they can sign up for just the meals.

Room rates range from \$129 to \$159 per night. You need to make your reservations by January 15, 2025 to get the special rate, so reserve early. Call the hotel directly at (800) 828-7873 and mention that you're with the Kiwanis Mid-Winter Convention.

The opening session on Friday night will be centered around Governor Vicki's T.E.A.M.S. theme for this year and include some fun and games.

# the POSSIBILITY PROJECT

In the past few years, the number of requests for Children's Fund support has grown tenfold. Last Kiwanis year, the Children's Fund could only support one project for every two requests. That is why we have launched The Possibility Project, the first fundraising campaign solely for Kiwanis and the kids we serve. With your personal or club gift to the Children's Fund, we can help Kiwanians impact more children's lives by awarding more and bigger grants to club projects.

Each month, young patients at Memorial Care Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach get "comfort bags" from the Kiwanis Club of Long Beach, California. The club assembles and delivers about 100 bags monthly. This project is possible because of the Pediatric Medicine Support Grant Program of the Kiwanis Children's Fund.

Recently, the Kiwanis Club of Bellevue received a micro-grant to fund their "Developing a Lifelong Love of Reading" program: The club will partner with local schools and other groups to purchase books and host three Book Markets for K-5 students that are in a specialized reading program. Scheduled before major school breaks, these events will support the school's diverse student population by preventing reading regression. Studies show that students who read over breaks return with improved reading and math scores. This KCF micro-grant will help fund the purchase of three books for each of the 80 students identified as the most in need.



Both grants shared above are possible because of gifts from individuals and clubs to the Children's Fund.

The PNW Possibility Project team has been hard at work making club and Division Council presentations. To date, over **\$6** million **US** have been raised for the Possibility Project. \$131,127 of that has come from the PNW!

So far, the PNW has two IMPACT CLUBS (a club pledge amount to the Possibility Project calculated by multiplying the number of club members by 500) - West Seattle and Spokane Valley. Both have made a pledge tailored to the size of their club and they will work towards meeting the pledge amount over the next five years. THANK YOU to these clubs and their members for leading the PNW in support of the Possibility Project.

## **CLUB SERVICE SHOWCASE**

#### **Christmas Made Brighter For Kids In Port Townsend**

Eyes light up on her three children as they tumble into the room, look at the small tree in their living room and with big smiles, call out, "Mommy! Santa came!"

This single mom working two part-time jobs could not have provided such gifts to these young ones without the support of Port Townsend Kiwanis Club's Kids' Christmas projects. Kids' Christmas is not just one effort but several projects in one. These projects include an incredible lift for club and community volunteers, and in December 2024, made the holidays brighter for 462 children in 163 families.



Port Townsend Kiwanis Club is the official local organization of Toys for Tots of East Jefferson County. Planning the season of giving begins in early summer and kicks off in high gear in November with inventory of the previous year's stock and distribution of about 50 Toys for Tots donation boxes by Kiwanis members to many local businesses. Advertising is next for the two "Stuff the Bus" events which take place simultaneously in two different areas of the county.



## **CLUB SERVICE SHOWCASE**



On the first Saturday of every December, club members and friends join volunteers from Jefferson Transit, Port Townsend Aktion Club, Port Townsend High School Key-Interact Club and local Cub Scouts to collect toys and cash donations. Transit provides the buses and transfers the donations to the fairgrounds, where all toys are sorted for distribution.

Following the sorting, the collection boxes are picked up the second week and taken to the fairgrounds to prepare for the two big days on the weekend, known as 'Christmas 4 Children' when parents "shop" in the warehouse with "shopper elves". Nearly every mom or dad or grandma who does the shopping is over the moon and many times teary-eyed with the whole experience and the full bags of toys and clothes to take home!



Many local children living with financial insecurity, when asked what they want for Christmas, state that they really need a new coat or jacket. "I need some gloves because my hands are cold at the bus stop." While the Stuff the Bus events are happening, the club also has a "Warm Drive" to collect new coats, jackets, hats, and gloves. The Warm Drive is still new and is supplemented by a local community grant offered in conjunction with UGN. Since Toys for Tots donations cannot be used for purchasing clothing and cold weather accessories, the Warm Drive and the local support provide the club with the resources to meet the children's cold weather needs.

Remember that single mom? She applied for the Christmas 4 Children service through Port Townsend Kiwanis and showed up at her designated time. A volunteer personal shopper led her around the spaces at the fairgrounds that were now stocked with tables, shelves, and racks full of toys, books, games, coats, socks, hats and more. She found a few wonderful new toys for her children and was nearly in tears when the personal shopper told her, "You need more -- here, take this, too."

The holiday spirit is alive in the hearts of the Port Townsend Kiwanis Club members as they share their joy with children and families in the greater Jefferson County communities. Learn more about Port Townsend Kiwanis' other holiday and year-round projects at ptkiwanis.org.

#### KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL

Dedicated to serving the children of the world, this global volunteer organization annually raises US\$390 million and dedicates more than 7.7 million hours to strengthening communities and helping children. Through service projects and fundraisers, Kiwanis members improve their communities, make lifelong friendships and, most importantly, help children reach their full potential.

#### **ADULTS**

Kiwanis International offers three clubs for adults: Kiwanis, Aktion Club and Circle K International. Kiwanis clubs serve their communities through more than 152,000 service projects each year. Aktion Club is the only community service club for adults with disabilities. It provides members with opportunities to become integrated into their communities while developing initiative and leadership skills. CKI is a student-led service organization, with clubs on college and university campuses in 19 nations.

#### YOUTH

Kiwanis offers three clubs for youth: Key Club, Builders Club and K-Kids. Key Club is the oldest and largest service organization for teens and teaches leadership through service to others. Builders Club provides students ages 11-14 with opportunities to develop leadership skills, improve self-esteem, increase civic engagement and learn life skills through service. K-Kids gives students ages 6-12 opportunities to work together on service projects, develop leadership potential and create strong moral character.

#### **PROGRAMS**

Kiwanis offers programs for students: Terrific Kids, Bring Up Grades, Key Leader and the Global Leadership Certificate. Terrific Kids and Bring Up Grades, both for students ages 6-12, teach children to plan, set goals, work with others and celebrate success. Key Leader is a weekend experiential leadership retreat for teens. Through the Global Leadership Certificate, Key Club and CKI members have access to courses on topics including building meaningful relationships, strategic versus tactical leadership, self-awareness, inclusion, civic engagement and being an agent for change.

Don't forget about K-Kids week! February 10<sup>th</sup>-14<sup>th</sup>. This is the week to celebrate what K-Kids do for their community. 
