Mid-Winter Conference Recap February 7–9, 2025, Hood River, Oregon

Our Mid-Winter Conference has come and gone and I believe that most everyone who attended had an enjoyable time. We kicked off the event on Friday night with a welcome from Hood River mayor Paul Blackburn, followed by opening comments from Governor Vicki. The kick-off included a no host bar and games, music and time to meet new people and reconnect with old friends.

Our PNW District CKI group held their DCON simultaneously with our conference, so they joined us for breakfast Saturday morning then headed off to do their own thing. It was great to capture some of that youthful energy to start the day.

The morning session included a presentation from Isabella Baldiserri, our PNW District Key Club Governor. This lady has a lot going for her. Her presentation was informative and fun to listen to. She is the perfect example of what kind of leaders our Service Leadership Programs are producing. Her speech was followed by our own PNW International Trustee, Jackie Sue McFarlin, who gave us an update on all the good things that Kiwanis is doing around the world. The first morning educational session showcased a "100 Years of Key Club" – where they started, what they're doing and where the headed. After this, the director of our Mount Hood Kiwanis Camp showed us all the work they're doing for hundreds of special needs kids and adults every year.

There was a two-hour break for lunch, giving folks a chance to browse the Kiwanis exhibits in the atrium and get some food at the neighboring restaurants. We also managed to sneak in some mid-year training for our current Lt. Governor class.

We were fortunate that Brad Boyd, our PNW Area Manager from International was able to attend. He gave us two sessions in the afternoon. The first one reviewed the new International initiative - Build, Nurture and Retain and the second one covered different membership models, i.e. Meet-Ups, Satellite Clubs and Corporate Memberships. Brad has worked with all of the above, has a wealth of knowledge.

Other afternoon sessions included "Club Boosts" presented by Melanie Bozak, our PNW District Membership co-chair, and "Ask Bob", presented by Bob Munger, who knows all the ins and outs of the Kiwanis computer programs. Both sessions were very interactive with many questions asked and answers provided. A session on "Running for Higher Office" was presented by Jackie Sue McFarlin and Roger Bell. This session defined the opportunities you have to serve Kiwanis beyond the club level. We closed out the afternoon with Mike Frucci talking about his "First Gents" project. The SEAD Initiative, (Support, Empower, Act, Destigmatize), is a group that addresses youth houselessness. First Gentleman Mike partnered with The Dalles Key Club and Kiwanians throughout the district to raise over \$400 in cash donations and a truckload of hygiene supplies to be distributed to houseless youth in the Gorge.

The hotel provided a delicious BBQ dinner for the Saturday night event. We had over 100 people in attendance and once again we had the CKI Kiwanians joining us. Governor Vicki gave a great speech about her T.E.A.M.S. theme for the year. We also had quick look forward to this year's ICON, which will be held in Pittsburg and DCON, which will be held at Spirit Mountain.

As is traditional, your PNW District board held their meeting on Sunday morning. They took care of the District's business and closed out the conference. Just a heads up, last year's Lt. Governor class president, Don Gibbard, announced his candidacy for District Governor Elect for next year at the meeting. One other note of interest – for those people who registered for the conference but were unable to attend due to unforeseen circumstances, the conference committee has agreed to provide a \$50 rebate for you to apply against the cost of registration for DCON this year.

Once again, the best part of attending a Kiwanis conference is the camaraderie.

Valentine's Day Luncheon by Ferndale Kiwanis

Ferndale Kiwanis Club was established in January of 1972 and just a few years later began a very special service project: serving local senior citizens a turkey dinner complete with all the fixin's, including stuffing, mashed potatoes, green beans, corn, a roll, gravy, tea, coffee and pie.

Over the years our senior dinner evolved into a Valentine's Day luncheon and the local Senior Center is transformed with pink, red and white decorations and guests are treated to one of our members, Roger Quiggle, and his trio playing soothing jazz standards.


This service project is truly a labor of love and long-time members Mel Hansen and Pete Harksell have been at the helm for decades. They shared a story about how one year the members in charge of cooking the turkey estimated two hours to cook, but had neglected to thaw the birds. So, our guests were served everything BUT turkey and then waited patiently for the turkey to be cooked fully about three hours later than planned. Every year we learn and refine and we think we have it down to a science now.



This cherished event is not only one that our club and the seniors look forward to, but also our up and coming leaders. The 4th and 5th grade students from Eagleridge Elementary- eagerly raise their hands to help. For most of these students, it is their first volunteering experience and, while some may start out feeling a little shy, they always rise up and embrace the experience. From opening doors and greeting our guests, taking coats, accompanying people to their seats, serving meals, bussing tables and then taking the pie cart around and squirting a healthy shot of whipping cream on a luscious dessert, faces young and old beam with delight.

Our student volunteers may also enjoy a plate of their own and we encourage them to join a table with some seniors and engage in conversation. We receive nothing but positive feedback from the guests on how charming and polite and hard-working these kids are. They represent their families, their schools and their generation extremely well.

Every teacher and parent reports back that the children felt it was a highlight of their year and that they plan on continuing down a path serving others. One parent whose eldest daughter helped for two years and now has the younger sibling helping, shared that big sister wanted to disguise herself as an old man and sneak in to join in on the fun again this year. Look what happens when you give our young people the opportunity to have their own "Kiwanis Moment".

Olympic Kiwanis of Port Angeles Creates Go Bags for Kids

Olympic Kiwanis members recently set up an assembly line to fill "Go Bags" for children who are being relocated in emergency placements to foster homes. This is the latest community project taken on by the club. Twenty bags were delivered to the Washington Department of Children, Youth and Families, where staff acknowledged the importance of helping youngsters during extremely traumatic times in their lives.

"No longer will these youth suffer the indignity of gathering their possessions into large trash bags to haul around when being moved from place to place. These Go Bags are designed to last and stay with the child for use whenever needed," says Olympic Kiwanis President Chuck Standley.

The sturdy and well-made duffel bags were donated by Day 1 Bags, a non-profit corporation out of Texas. Olympic Kiwanis Club members filled each one with a stuffed toy, puzzle book, little games, coloring books, crayons and personal care items like shampoo, toothbrushes and paste, juice boxes or water, granola bars and a handmade blanket. The beautiful blankets are expected to become comforting and warm treasures for the kids. They were crafted by members of Project Linus, a nonprofit, whose local volunteers make blankets for children in need here on the Olympic Peninsula.

Items were donated for the bags from various community members to include Project Linus, Angel Mantchev, DDS, Crowley Dentistry, Port Angeles Food Bank, Locke Family, Irene Wyman, Cathy Janssen, and club members David & Carla Sue, Rena & Tom Clark, Scott Simms, Fran Howell, Don & Geri Zanon, and Chuck & Martha Standley. A big community effort will assist foster children in an emergency, letting them know that their community cares.


