

Kiwanis Family-Centered

- Promote an understanding of the relationships among the various groups of the Kiwanis Family.
- Develop/foster effective means of communication between the family entities.
- Utilize the strengths of each group to support the needs/projects of K-Family Members.
- Foster an environment, (between the family members), of trust and cooperation to insure the best possible outcomes with community service project endeavors.

Service-Driven

- Perform annual reviews of current club projects to evaluate their effectiveness.
- Perform "Community Surveys Needs Assessments, to stay current with the problem area(s) of your specific community.
- Work Collaboratively with schools, non-profits, other service organizations and government social service agencies to enhance the effectiveness of your projects.
- Investigate and Evaluate (annually) the prospect of carrying out joint projects with the other clubs in your Division/District/KI.
- Promote the "Kiwanis Children's Fund" with your club members.

Membership-Focused

- The focus of club leadership needs to center on supporting the activities of your current club members.
- Every club needs to have an active "Membership Team" that supports the proposition that "more members means more service".
- Club members and leaders will find support for increasing their club membership and effectiveness
 through their utilization of the Membership Team and materials that are offered from the
 PNW District and Kiwanis International.
- Perform annual club surveys of current and former club members to recognize and understand what can be done to better support our members.
- Be conscious of promoting Kiwanis through the wearing of Kiwanis-branded clothing or Kiwanis pins.

Leadership Education-Oriented

- Promote Kiwanis education at the club level, (history/goals/objects).
- Promote CLE (Club Leadership Education) courses to your club and Division leaders
- Promote/Sponsor a Kiwanian that has a desire to advance thru the ranks at the Club, Division, or District level.
- Ensure that all club members, associated with our SLP programs, are current with their requirements including background checks.



Rediscovering Purpose, Reigniting Passion

We all have a reason we joined Kiwanis.

For some, it was an invitation from a friend. For others, a desire to serve, to connect, or to make a difference in the life of a child. But as the years go by, routines set in. Projects come and go. Meetings blur together. And sometimes, our "why" gets buried beneath the busyness.

That's why it's important—vital, even—to pause and ask: Why am I here? Why do I keep showing up?

The Power of Purpose

Your "why" is your internal compass. It keeps you grounded during hard seasons and helps you see the bigger picture when the to-do list feels long. It turns service from an obligation into a calling.

When clubs focus on their "why," they don't just survive—they thrive. Meetings feel more meaningful. Projects connect more deeply with the community. New members can feel the energy and purpose in the room.

How to Find (or Reclaim) Your Why

Here are a few ways to reflect on your Kiwanis journey:

- 1. Think Back to the Beginning What drew you to Kiwanis in the first place? Was it a project that moved you? A person who inspired you? That first "aha" moment matters—it still holds value today.
- 2. Celebrate a Moment That Mattered Was there a time when Kiwanis made you feel like you truly made a difference? Maybe it was packing backpacks, hearing a thank-you from a student, or working late at a fundraiser and laughing with club friends. Those moments are your why.
- 3. Ask: What Would My Community Lose Without Us? Kiwanis doesn't exist for its own sake. It exists to serve. What would be missing in your town if your club disappeared tomorrow? What needs would go unmet? What kids would miss out?

Try This at Your Next Club Meeting

Kick off your next meeting by asking members to share their "why" in one sentence. Keep it light and personal. You might be surprised how meaningful—and energizing—it is to hear the stories that brought people to the table.

You could also try a short activity:

- Each member writes their "why" on a notecard.
- Post them anonymously on a wall or table.
- Read a few out loud and let others guess whose is whose!

Reconnecting With Purpose

Whether you've been a member for 30 years or 30 days, your why matters. It shapes how you lead, how you serve, and how you inspire others to join in.

So take a breath. Reflect. And remember: your presence in Kiwanis is part of something much bigger—a movement to make our communities better, one child and one act of service at a time.

It is with heavy hearts that we share the passing of our dear friend and fellow Kiwanian, Melanie Bozak of the Port Townsend Kiwanis Club. Melanie died recently after a long and courageous struggle with cancer.


















2025 DCON RECAP SPIRIT MOUNTAIN CASINO IN GRAND RONDE, OREGON

A message from 2025-2026 Governor-Elect Don Gibbard Keys to the Future



At the beginning of this service year, there were 17 orphan Key Clubs in our district. Starting this new service year beginning October 1, 2026 it looks like we will have 21 orphaned Key Clubs and several more potential throughout the year. What does this really mean? It means that there are fewer Kiwanis Clubs providing guidance and direction. It means there are fewer support dollars for the work Key Club does in their schools and community. It means there is less interaction between our Key Club members and our Kiwanis Family.

The most common cause for an orphaned Key Club is the loss of the local Kiwanis Club. Too often we forget the impact closing a Kiwanis Club has on the community. It is not just the membership that is

affected. Think about the projects and service your club has provided. Consider also the years of service your club has given to the community. All that goes away when you decide to discontinue your service.

As Kiwanians, we strive to "Serve the Children of the World." That includes our Key Clubs and other SLP's. Without a Kiwanis sponsor, our Key Clubs lose the community connection and experience of adult leaders. They struggle to finance their projects and the leadership experience they gain from attending your Kiwanis meetings and District Conventions.

As we move forward, I want to challenge all of us to begin thinking about solutions for continued support of Key Club as a whole and more specifically, about alternative support for orphaned Key Clubs. I am looking for ideas to provide financial support and mentoring of our young leaders. I am looking for ways to strengthen our local clubs, so we don't leave our kids out on a limb.


West Valley Kiwanis Supports Local 4H and FFA

For 70 years in the Yakima Valley, the community of West Valley has supported a local 4-H and FFA fair to give the youth of the community an outlet to "showcase" their skills with their animals, home economics and agricultural exhibits. While it has had it's "up and down" years, (especially with the Covid difficulties); for 68 of those years, the one constant that has always been counted on is that the Kiwanis Club of West Valley would be in their concessions building serving breakfast, lunch and early dinner to the exhibitors, and everyone else in attendance.



This is a 3-day labor intensive service project requiring at least 10 people at all times, working in shifts, for over 300 hours, including planning sessions. This picture fully embraces Governor Vicki's theme for this year, TEAM'S (Together Everyone Accomplishes More Service). It captures a member of Key Club, the wife of a club member, the current Lt. Governor from a neighboring club, and a West Valley club member fulfilling their individual duties for another successful day of feeding the fair goers.

The fair board receives 100% of the funds raised, which for this year's event equates to over \$6500. These funds are then used in support of the fair's activities and awards; all for the kids.

KCCP - Research in Childhood Cancer Gives Us Hope!

Our very talented and brilliant physician/scientists at our 3 major children's hospitals in the Pacific Northwest (which are Seattle Children's Hospital, Doernbecher Children's Hospital in Portland, and B.C. Children's Hospital in Vancouver, B.C.) continue to make major break throughs in childhood cancer through their research on new types of immunotherapy using AI and other advanced super computer technologies to create new, less invasive therapies and cures for children diagnosed with childhood cancer. Researchers will soon be able to predict which children are the most at risk for developing childhood cancer, what type of childhood cancer they are likely to have, and when and where the cancer will appear. Our physician/scientist researchers at our 3 major hospitals will eventually shift their research to prevention and early intervention for the children who are most at risk for having childhood cancer based on the information obtained from AI and super computers. In addition, clinical trials using immunotherapies that are a lot less toxic and less invasive than chemo and radiation continue to demonstrate success in saving the lives of children diagnosed with advanced childhood cancers.

Donations from your Kiwanis Club and Key Clubs as well as individual donations to our Kiwanis Children's Cancer Program (KCCP) are making a huge impact for our physician/scientists who are advancing the science and bringing about better therapies and cures for childhood cancer. This is especially important now that research funds for childhood cancer are becoming increasingly more difficult to obtain from our federal and local government health agencies.

Congratulations to our hardworking Kiwanis Clubs and Key Clubs in our PNW District that held fundraisers and made donations this past Kiwanis year to our 3 major hospitals in our KCCP community!

We welcome and appreciate your continued support of our PNW District's Kiwanis Children's Cancer Program (KCCP) at our 3 major children's hospitals so that our dedicated researchers can save the lives of even more children who, through no fault of their own, are diagnosed with these cruel and painful types of diseases that are known as childhood cancer.

We thank each and every one of you from the bottom of our big Kiwanis hearts!

We are also so thankful to Frank Morehouse for establishing Kiwanis Children's Cancer Program (KCCP) in the Pacific Northwest District.

Youth Protection:

Training, Policies and Procedures, and Responsibility

As of October 1, 2025, everyone's Youth Protection training requirement becomes due for the new Kiwanis Year. Kiwanis dedicates the entire first week of October each year to Youth Protection Week. This serves as a reminder to take action. The sooner...the better. As of August 31, 2025, we still had over 70 clubs that had not completed the required training and/or followed through to mark it in the Secretary's dashboard. This is something we need to take more seriously by completing the training and then entering it into the records. Members have a responsibility to abide by Kiwanis International's Policies and Procedures to protect the youth, our organization, and our members.

Kiwanis International has made it very easy. Each club is responsible for completing its own Annual Youth Protection Training as soon as possible, each year. Let's see how quickly we can get it done this year.

YOUTH PROTECTION POLICIES & PROCEDURES UPDATED OCTOBER 2022

These policies can be found in Kiwanis International Policies and Procedures as **Procedure 432.**All adults working with youth under the age of 18 at any Kiwanis event are required to read/understand, agree to and abide by these policies.

EDUCATION: Every Kiwanis club is expected to inform and educate its members on these policies, best practices and required actions for individuals who become aware of youth in potentially harmful situations. This education must occur annually, including providing a copy of these policies to each club member. Every Kiwanis district is expected to provide an educational forum or workshop at every district-produced convention and conference regarding policies and best practices for adults working with youth, using materials provided by Kiwanis International.

CRIMINAL HISTORY BACKGROUND CHECKS: Kiwanis

International requires clubs to have a clear criminal history background check for any club member serving as an advisor to any Service Leadership Programs club. The check must be conducted and verified by Kiwanis International. Any person without a clear criminal history background check may not serve as the advisor. Approved background checks shall be valid for no more than two years. Kiwanis advisors shall acquire a new criminal history background check upon their initial appointment to the position.

CHAPERONE: A chaperone is defined as a Kiwanis member, faculty member, parent, legal guardian or person who is in loco parentis, twenty-one (21) years of age or older, who has been approved by the school or agency and registered with the school or agency to accompany the youth members at the specific event. All chaperones (club members and non-members) participating in any single-day or overnight Service Leadership Programs event must have a clear criminal history background check and must have completed Kiwanis International youth protection training. Additionally, chaperones must follow all applicable policies and procedures.

CHAPERONES FOR OVERNIGHT EVENTS: A minimum of one adult per 10 students must be serving as chaperones during the entirety of an overnight event.

CHAPERONES FOR SINGLE-DAY EVENTS: A minimum of one adult per 50 students must be serving as chaperones during the entirety of a single-day event.

OVERNIGHT EVENTS: All adults (club members and non-members) registered for or staying overnight at any Service Leadership Programs event must have a clear criminal history background check and must have completed Kiwanis International annual youth protection training. However, parents/guardians of participating students who are not chaperones may attend the event for a maximum of one overnight stay without a criminal history background check.

OVERNIGHT STAYS: While attending a Kiwanis event that requires an overnight stay in a hotel or camp/ conference setting, adequate adult chaperoning is expected and must include no fewer than one adult male for each ten or part of ten youth males, and one adult female for each ten or part of ten youth females. Except for a parent sharing a sleeping room or other sleeping quarters (e.g., a tent) with his/her own child, no adult should share a hotel or dormitory sleeping room or other sleeping quarters with a youth. In the event that sleeping quarters consist of multiple beds (such as in a bunkhouse or camp cabin), adults may share the sleeping quarters with youth members of the same gender, provided that two or more adults are present.

DISTRICT ADMINISTRATORS FOR SERVICE

LEADERSHIP PROGRAMS: Kiwanis International requires all SLP district administrators to complete an application process, which includes submission of a completed application, having a clear background check conducted and verified by Kiwanis International, completion of Kiwanis International youth protection training and any other elements that may be required by Kiwanis International. After receipt of an individual's application and verification of all required elements, Kiwanis International will review the information and decide, in



its sole and absolute discretion, whether the individual is accepted to become an SLP district administrator. Kiwanis has no obligation to allow an individual to become an SLP district administrator based solely on a "clear" background check. Denial may be appealed via the process outlined in Procedure 197.

ANNUAL MEETING WITH KEY CLUB AND CKI ADMINISTRATORS: Each Key Club district administrator and CKI district administrator shall hold an annual meeting, either in person or virtually, with Kiwanis International staff and the district Youth Protection manager to discuss respective Key Club and CKI district events and activities and the status of the respective district Key Club and CKI programs.

TRANSPORTATION: When transporting youth, the best practice is the "rule of threes," with at least three people in the vehicle at all times, along with documented approval from a parent or guardian for the transportation arrangements. When both of these conditions cannot be met, one of them should be. All transportation decisions should be made in accordance with local laws and school policies.

USE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, TOBACCO, MARIJUANA AND OTHER SUBSTANCES: While

attending any Kiwanis event that is produced primarily by or for the benefit of youth, adults are expected to refrain from using or being under the influence of alcoholic beverages, tobacco and/or marijuana products, even if prescribed for medicinal use. In addition, the use and/or possession of illegal drugs or the improper/illegal use of legal drugs is prohibited.

MEDICATIONS: The possession of prescription and non-prescription medications by youth at a Kiwanis event should be permitted only by the written permission of the parent/guardian.

REPORTING: If a Kiwanian observes troubling behavior involving a youth at a Kiwanis event or becomes aware of a situation that is illegal or potentially unsafe for a young person at a Kiwanis event, they must immediately contact the appropriate personnel at the event, as well as provide notification to law enforcement personnel as appropriate. All local, state, provisional and federal laws regarding reporting must be followed. If the Kiwanian becomes aware of the troubling behavior after the event, they must contact leaders of the event and provide notification to law enforcement personnel as appropriate. Kiwanis

International now offers a 24-hour, confidential helpline at 1-866-607-SAFE. The helpline can be used if you think a youth has been harmed or their safety and well-being are at risk.

PERSONAL INFORMATION: All documents bearing personal information of any youth attending a Kiwanis event, including registration forms, medical information forms, permission to treat forms, etc., should be treated as confidential. Processes that protect this information must be created, including minimizing the number of people who have access to any such documents. The documents shall be maintained a minimum of three years or longer, as may be required by applicable state/provincial laws and regulations. After the maintenance period has expired, the documents shall be destroyed in a way that maintains confidentiality, such as shredding. The disposal and destruction of all confidential information shall conform to applicable state/provincial laws and regulations.

YOUTH AND SOCIAL MEDIA: For any social networking site that involves requesting a connection (such as inviting someone to be a friend on Facebook), adults should never initiate such connections with youth. If a youth requests such a connection from a Kiwanian, the Kiwanian should use their best judgment in responding. Adults should treat their interaction with youth on social networking sites as though the interaction were occurring in public, in front of other adults and young people. In other words, if it would not be appropriate to say something to a young person in public, it should not be said as a comment on a social networking site, either. Kiwanians should refrain from interactions that can be seen as excessive (such as constantly "liking" or commenting on a person's posts on Facebook). Prior to posting any media online, such as photographs, obtain permission from all individuals (or parents, for minors) who appear in that media; it could be illegal to do otherwise. See Kiwanis International Policy B for complete social media guidelines.

BEHAVIORAL OR HEALTH ISSUES: Kiwanians are often seen by a young person as adults to trust with personal and/or sensitive information. Kiwanians should refrain from counseling youth and should instead find, or assist the young person in finding, appropriate expert assistance.

CONFLICTS WITH OTHER RULES: Whenever these policies conflict with local school policies or rules, or local, state/ provincial or national laws or regulations, the highest applicable standards for conduct shall prevail.


