Governor in 1968 and then proceeded to chair six different district committees from 1969 through 1981, including four years as Chairman of Special Club Services.

Anthony M. Mettler became Governor Elect in 1974, served us all as Governor in 1975 (earning the Distinguished Governor Award) and contributed to a smooth leadership transition with his counsel as the Immediate Past Governor in 1976.

Past Governor Tony did not decide to rest on his outstanding accomplishments. Instead, when Kiwanis International called, as always, Past Governor Tony responded by serving as chairman of two international committees. Tony has served a total of seven years at the international level.

Past Governor Tony and his wife, Mary Jane, were married in 1948. They are the parents of a daughter, Claudia, who is a graduate of the University of Michigan with a degree in chemical engineering and has other degrees including a Doctorate in Business Education from Western Michigan University.

Past Governor Tony has a B.S. Degree from Central Michigan University and a Masters Degree from Michigan State University. Tony was employed as a teacher and student counselor, primarily in the Allen Park school system for over 32 years.

Our Distinguished Kiwanian also found time to participate in associations related to his profession. He served in the Armed Forces and is a member of the American Legion and the Disabled American Veterans. He has also served on various city commissions and committees.
