Lee Ann Hundt, Executive Director, K-W Urban Wigwam Project

Lee Ann has been Executive Director for K-W Urban Native Wigwam Project for nearly 5 years. She attended Cambrian College in Sudbury to become a Native Child & Family Worker (social work program) to assist indigenous families and has served on numerous boards in the community over th last two decades. She has been a resident of Kitchener since 1998, actively working with the indigenous community since 2004. She herself is an Anishnaabe woman from Sagamok First Nations, a mother of four and grandmother (nokomis) of three who enjoys spending time with her family and helping others.



Lee Ann has a strong connection to her Native culture and enjoys educating others. Lee Ann is a Sixties Scoop Survivor and her Grandparents are both Residential School Survivors. In her current role as Executive Director, Lee Ann manages and supports 146 indigenous families or individuals in various places in the Waterloo Region with 24 staff and several student interns.

6. Committees & Reports:

Committee reports are received each month at the Board meeting of the Club Officers and Directors at Westmount Golf Club. Committee work is essential to smooth functioning of the Club and all members are encouraged to participate in at least one of our thirteen committees. Typically, assignments require an average of only 1-2 hours per month. K-W Kiwanis committees have the charters outlined below

Affordable Housing

Charter: Work with Property Management to oversee the operations of the Cedar Court and Valley View housing units owned by Kiwanis.

Fundraising (a)

New Ideas (Receive & evaluate proposals for new fundraising activities. Interface with the Board to approve new initiatives.)
(b) Bingo (Organize and recruit volunteers for bingos run by K-W Kiwanis. Train volunteers.)

Sales (Organize the calendar created by K-W Kiwanis for fundraising. Recruit advertisers, determine winners of cash draws and allocate prizes.)

Scholarships & Bursaries

Charter: Determine criteria for the evaluation of scholarship and bursary applications. Receive and review applications. Select recipients and personally communicate/deliver the awards.

Membership Charter:

Advise members on how to introduce prospective members to Kiwanis and provide welcome packets for new members. Meet once a quarter to plan recruitment and retention. Approve new member applications and forward them to the Board. Review honorary memberships annually. Check on absentee or delinquent members.

Music Festival Charter:

Continue to refine and improve all aspects of the renowned Kiwanis Music Festival's operation. Develop and utilize permanent check lists for all aspects of the festival so nothing is missed and we continually learn from mistakes and maintain improvements. Create fundraising vehicles specifically for the music festival with the goal of being financially self-sufficient.

Service Leadership Programs

Charter:

Provide liaison between Kiwanis student organizations and our membership. Look for every opportunity to initiate Kiwanis student organizations and activities. Provide necessary support to all sponsored Kiwanis student organizations. Help out with Key Service Leadership training events.

Program & Club Meetings

Charter:

Plan and improve the regular club meetings to keep them interactive, fun and informative. Make everyone feel that time spent at meetings is "time well spent". Maintain sociability among members as a top priority by planning outside activities that foster good fellowship.

Financial Investment - Vacant

Marketing & Public Relations

Charter:

Raise awareness of Kiwanis in our community. Publicize events. Maintain the club website and social media outlets. Distribute a regular newsletter to keep members up to date and assist with community outreach and recruitment.

New/Existing Projects

Charter: Assess all requests for funds submitted to the club with respect to how well they meet our criteria and make their recommendations to the membership. Manage existing projects, recommend their continuance or discontinuance. Search for new club service projects, making sure they meet our criteria, and present them as options to the membership.
