May 7 The Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held at Westmount Golf Club. The district Lieutenant-Governor David LacLennan was in attendance to witness the election of new officers and directors for 2024-2025. Daisy Arseneault was elected President for a second term and Keri Cameron was voted in as the President-Elect. Maureen Farkouh will serve as treasurer starting October 1, 2024. New Directors were nominated and approved by the Board: Jean Stacey, Paula Rand, Joan Richardson, and Kevin Twomey. May 18 The Academic Scholarship & Bursary Committee finished its review of bursary candidates today and identified eight potential awardees for Kiwanis bursaries in 2024. There was some discussion of the number of awards and the adequacy of the individual awards in meeting rising costs of education in future years.

May 23 Bingo Night was held at the K-W Gaming Centre and brought in more funds for the academic bursary program.

May 28 The Affordable Housing Committee met to consider and approve the draft budgets on Kiwanis Foundation properties. Frank Prospero reported that the auditor were straightforward and positive for both the Cedar Court and Valleyview projects. Also a Letter was received on May 22 from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) to the effect that "Following your application to the GMF (Green Municipal Fund) Sustainable Affordable Housing program, we are writing to provide you with this non-binding expression of interest which outlines our current understanding of your project..." at Cedar Court apartments in Kitchener.

The letter of interest indicated that K-W Kiwanis now has the attention of FCM to provide a maximum "loan" of \$2,306,804 with a 30 year term and a maximum grant of \$2,045,656 to the Foundation to support the K-W Kiwanis affordable housing project.

May 29 The academic Scholarship and Bursary Committee met at the Kitchen Korner for lunch to discuss the results of the 2024 competition. Lou Gere provided a cost summary from one of the students at Conestoga College of the cost of books and institutional fees for a single term there. The amount was \$2710. Consequently a discussion ensued about whether awards of \$2000 to 4 students might be preferable to the current program of \$1000 to 8 students. Lou suggested that he do some more comparative calculations and bring a recommendation to the next meeting of the committee in the first two weeks of October.
