

October Fundraiser: *Coats for Kiwanis*

The "Coats for Kiwanis" K-W fundraiser has been launched and promises to be a very successful coat sale. Staples has stepped up to sponsor the event. Gently-used, highgarments are being collected around the Waterloo Region and will be sold to the public on Oct.5, 2024 at Cedar Court. Family and friends will be able to buy Kiwanis coats at irresistible prices too. All types and sizes of coats will be available, from kids jackets to adult parkas for \$5-\$30. The club is holding the sale to run our projects and clothe the community at rock bottom prices.

We still need a few volunteers to help run the sale itself. There will be 2 cashiers, 2-4 merchandizers to keep garments on the racks, and volunteers at the entrance and exit to ensure a safe shopping experience while keeping the number of customers in the space itself to a manageable level. For example, Circle K joined forces last month to help make Kids Day a big success. We are so pleased with the young aspiring leaders in our Kiwanis Circle K club.

Circle K International (CKI) is the largest student-run volunteer organization of its kind, with over 12,600 members on 500 campuses in 17 countries. CKI mirrors the mandate of Kiwanis at the university level in making our community a better place to live, through service, with a special emphasis on helping children.
