This event was an entertaining evening of cocktails, raffles, live and silent auctions, and a delicious dinner. Individuals were inducted into the prestigious Guelph Sports Hall of Fame for 2025 and Broadcaster Brian Williams shared stories of his 50 year career in sports as the keynote speaker. All proceeds supported the Kiwanis Club of Guelph charities including Belwood Lodge and Camp, the Kiwanis Music Festival of Guelph, the Staples Backto-School Program, and the Teen ETCH Creative Writing Contest.

Circle K members also hosted the 2025 district convention (DCON) in Waterloo for clubs from all over Eastern Canada. The event included a full day of energy, service, and celebration. The DCON agenda included workshops on fundraising, inspiring speakers from the Kiwanis Family, and District Board elections and concluded with recognition of outstanding clubs from across the province. In March, Circle K District Governor Shradhaa Srikanth also launched a newsletter for Eastern Canada CKI members – the Governor's Gazette. Circle K International (CKI) is the largest student-run volunteer organization of its kind, with over 12,600 members on over 500 campuses in 17 countries. However our club is especially proud of our local up-and-coming group of civic leaders. CKI mirrors the mandate of Kiwanis at the university level in making our community a better place to live, through service, with a special emphasis on helping children.

Key Club for students aged 14-18: High schoolers can apply to become members of our K-W Kiwanis Key Clubs. Members run their own meetings and devise service projects in the Waterloo Region to develop leadership skills.
