shop offered lots of space for the 11 clothing racks it took to display all the donations.

Sales began (somewhat unexpectedly) at 1:30 am Saturday morning when a city

employee on the night shift spotted a coat she had to have. Another coat sold at 6:50 am just before the official opening of the sale. Then our team really went to work.

Many thanks to Marilyn Motz, Malcolm Shantz, Angela Vieth, Alan Chalmers, and Jean Stacey for transporting the coats to the market. Kevin Twomey and Maureen Farkouh ran the cash box. Carol Dixon rented 6 racks and extra hangers to display the wares. Paula Rand collected, sorted, cleaned and repaired the garments as needed. Joan Richardson-Horsey contributed 3 double racks and Paula Rand provided 2 more for a total of eleven. All in all, over 300 items were donated by the large apartment buildings in Waterloo, some still with store-bought tags on them. Thank you Julian Angel at Barrelyards and Al on William Street! Half the coats were sold before 2 pm at the Market and the remainder were donated to the local charities St. John's Kitchen and KWFightBack.

4. Service Leadership Clubs

K-W Kiwanis runs Leadership clubs to engage young students in community building and public service.

Circle K International for college students: The University of Waterloo Circle K club runs its own service projects with the guidance of an approved Kiwanis advisor. Currently it has a roster of over two dozen members and is actively involved in community events.

Circle K International (CKI) is the largest student-run volunteer organization of its kind, with over 12,600 members on over 500 campuses in 17 countries. However our club is especially proud of our local up-and-coming group of civic leaders. CKI mirrors the mandate of Kiwanis at the university level in making our community a better place to live, through service, with a special emphasis on helping children.

The current Circle K president Jordan Kaye volunteered at this year's Coats for Kiwanis sale. Her club member Portrait also joined in the fun, modelling coats from the racks. Thank you Circle K!

Key Club for students aged 14-18: High school students can apply to become members of our K-W Kiwanis Key Clubs. Key Club members run their own meetings and devise service projects in the Kitchener-Waterloo Region to develop leadership skills.

Key Club members are eligible to attend the annual leadership conference that Kiwanis International runs for their age group. Key Clubbers also have the benefit of guidance and record-keeping by an approved advisor from our Kiwanis Club.
