



#### Kiwanis Club of Lincoln Awarded Grant To Support Local School Book Vending Machine

The Kiwanis Club of Lincoln announced a grant award from the International Kiwanis Children's Fund to support the purchase and installation of a book vending machine at First Street Elementary School.

This unique initiative aims to foster a culture of love for reading among its students.

The project promotes literacy and empowers children to build their home libraries. By providing access to a diverse selection of books, the vending machine will serve as an incentive for students to cultivate a lifelong love for reading. Research shows that allowing children to choose their books significantly increases their engagement in reading and enhances comprehension skills.

"We are thrilled to have received this grant, which will support our ongoing efforts to nurture the growth and development of children in our community," said Colette Sullivan, vice president and co-chair of the grants committee for the Kiwanis Club of Lincoln. "Our club is deeply committed to initiatives that benefit children, and we believe that promoting literacy is crucial for their future success."

The vending machine will be prominently placed in the school cafeteria, ensuring it remains easily accessible to students throughout the day. Students will have the opportunity to earn tokens on special occasions such as their birthdays, fifth-grade promotion and through Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) awards. These tokens can then be exchanged for books of their choice from the vending machine.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony is scheduled to take place in early fall at First Street Elementary School, marking the official launch of this innovative literacy initiative.

In addition to the \$4,000 grant, funding for the project is being provided by the First Street Parent Teacher Organization and the Cynthia Liddell and Alan Tottle Foundations. The Kiwanis Club has donated \$3,500 to the project so far. The total project cost, including books for the machine, is \$10,000.

Liddell, Kiwanis Club community liaison, emphasized the importance of community collaboration in realizing this project's success.

"Our club is dedicated to working alongside local partners to address the needs of our youth," said Liddell. "We are always looking for opportunities to make a positive impact in our community, and this project is a testament to that commitment."

Key Club was the idea of two Sacramento Kiwanis club members, Albert C. Olney and Frank C. Vincent, who also were high school administrators.

They approached their Kiwanis Club of Sacramento with the idea of starting a junior service club in the high school. It would resemble Kiwanis, have its own classifications based on school interests and hold luncheon meetings.

The club was comprised of the key boys in the school, willing to serve the school in any way possible and to create better school spirit. Thus, the club was dubbed Key Club. Originally it meant *Kiwanis Educating Youth*.

Soon, the club that started out as a vocational guidance program expanded to become a complete service organization for the whole school. It also offered a social aspect to balance its service activities.

Today, Key Club is the oldest and largest service program for high school students in the world. It has more than 250,000 members in 5,000 clubs in 30 countries. Check out a timeline of important dates in the organization's long history or read the Key Club story.

- · 1925 The first Key Club meets at Sacramento High School.
- · 1939 Florida association forms, becoming the first Key Club District.
- 1943 Key Club movement achieves "International" designation. Delegates to the first Key Club

- · 1952 The 1,000th club is chartered.
- 1956 In Washington, D.C. the 14th Annual Key Club International Convention featured a "boyish popular" U.S. Senator John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts. When the soon-to-be U.S. President enters the convention hall, delegates storm him with banners bearing his state's name.
- · 1967 The first Key Club outside of the United States and Canada is chartered, at Nassau, Bahamas.
- · 1968 2,610 members attend the international convention.
- · 1975 Key Clubs celebrate their 50th Anniversary
- · 1977 Female Students are admitted into Key Clubs.
- · 1987 Kiwanis International allow females to become members
- · 1991 Michelle McMillen becomes the first female member to be elected Key Club president.
- · 1992 Key Club membership reaches 146,972 members in 4,013 clubs, in 17 nations.
- · 1997 Key Club launches its first website.
- · 1998 Key Clubs raise more than \$1.2 million for UNICEF to fight Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD).
- 1998 First Key Club strategic plan is developed.
- · 1999 Membership tops the 200,000 mark.
- · 2000 Key Clubs celebrates their 75th Anniversary.
- · 2005 Key Club's membership reaches 243,422 members.
- · 2008 Key Club members raise more than \$1.3 million to fight HIV/AIDS in Swaziland.
- 2010 Key Clubs exist in 30 countries, with membership over 250,00 in 5,000 clubs.
- 2014 January 2, 2014 in Cal-Nev-Ha District there are 13,315 Kiwanians and as of January 15, 2014 there are 36,726 Key Club Members.
- 2014 Sacramento High School, the birthplace of Key Club still has a Key Club "H80001".

## **Division Inter-Club Meetings**

Inter-Club: An inter-club meeting is a meeting or activity staged by two or more Kiwanis family clubs including Division Council Meetings, Kiwanis Club, Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids, Aktion Club, Conferences & Conventions.

The definition of an inter-club was expanded from simply attending another Kiwanis club meeting to include attending Fundraisers, Projects, Activities and Social Events of another K-Family Club.

The broadened definition promotes more opportunities for fellowship, education and encourages greater interaction between *Kiwanis Clubs and our Service Leadership Programs*:

- Clubs with 20 or Fewer Members need a minimum of <u>two</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 21-30 of three members need a minimum of three members attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of <u>four</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.

Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.

Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting **Kiwanis' Fifth Object**, which is "**To provide, through this club, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community**".

Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.

To do this, many clubs also sponsor a Kiwanis family club - K-Kids for primary school children; Builders Clubs for adolescents; Key Clubs for teens; CKI clubs for university students and Aktion Clubs for adults living with disabilities - to reach more people and have a greater service impact on their communities.

Traditional and Not: No two Kiwanis clubs look exactly the same. Each member's and community's needs are different, and each club should look different. Some clubs are very traditional, with weekly meetings and a strong sense of history. Other clubs don't meet at all, and instead hold meetings online and only come together for service projects. Newer clubs may follow the 3-2-1 concept: 3 hours of service, 2 hours of social activity and a 1-hour meeting each month. Clubs should reflect their communities and their members and should work to meet their needs. Flexibility is key to a successful club.

Fellowship and Fun: Kiwanis members don't just do service - they have fun. Members make new friends by being part of a club where they attend meetings and participate in social events. Kiwanis clubs also provide excellent networking opportunities for professionals. Members meet new people from all over their region and the world through service projects, fundraising and by attending district and Kiwanis International conventions.

- 2. To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- 3. To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business and professional standards.
- 4. To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.
- 5. To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service and to build better communities.
- 6. To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and goodwill.

## Structure of Kiwanis

#### Club Level

It all starts with members in a club. Every club has a few things in common. For example, clubs have a president, vice president(s), secretary, and treasurer. Clubs may also have other leadership positions, such as committee chairs.

#### **Division Level**

Each club is clustered together with clubs in the area to form a division. Divisions are overseen by a lieutenant governor, who is a representative of the district board (see "District" category below). The number of divisions and lieutenant governors varies by district.

#### District Level

A district is made up of several divisions. There are currently 49 districts and provisional districts within Kiwanis International. Some include only one state (example: Kansas District) or country (example: Malaysia District), while others are made up of multiple states (example: Minnesota-Dakotas District) or countries (example: Switzerland-Liechtenstein District). The rest are made up of geographical regions (example: Pacific Northwest District).

Each district is led by a governor who is elected with the rest of the executive board at the district's annual convention. The district's executive board includes a governor, secretary, and treasurer (or combined secretary-treasurer). Other board positions include the lieutenant governors and district chairs.

## International Level

All 49 districts and provisional districts, as well as Kiwanis nations that do not fit into any district, make up Kiwanis International. Currently, there are Kiwanis clubs in approximately 80 countries and geographic territories.

Each year, delegates at the Kiwanis International convention elect members and officers of the Kiwanis International Board, which includes a president, president-elect, vice president, past president and 15 trustees. The trustees work with the districts, similar to how lieutenant governors work with divisions.
