



Remembering Rick Dwyer, 3/19/37 – 2/21/23 RIP

Longtime member Rick Dwyer passed away on February 21st after a lengthy illness. He is survived by wife Marge and four children: Carolyn, Leslie, William P. IV (who knew Rick was William P. III ?) and Sheila. Rick was born in S.F. but

raised in Sacramento, graduating from Christian Bros. High School.



Rick was a Navy veteran, real estate broker, business acquisition consultant and GREAT KIWANIAN. He joined Suburban in May of 1991 and served as president during the 1995-96 year. For years, he helped our yearly crab feed be the huge financial success that it was. As the Crab Boss, he would estimate the amount of crab needed, purchase it at lowest available price, ensure its delivery freshly packed in ice, and then manage the "spirited" Crab Crew, making sure the crab was dished up and ready to be continually delivered by the table servers.

Rick was also a strong proponent of the Kiwanis Family House, serving on the Board of Directors for many years. Many KFH old-timers say that we wouldn't have the

current outstanding House we have without Rick. With his expertise in commercial real estate and lending, he was able to secure the loan with less funding than was available and to get construction started, and he then worked his finance magic to get it completed. He should be on top of the KFH HOF.



Many funny and heart-felt stories were shared at his Celebration of Life on Friday March 17th. Because of various snafu's, the obituary, noting the celebration, was not published until Wed. 3/15. Luckily, Mr. McKelligon saw it and alerted the club at our meeting that day. Suburban members Finns, Johnson, McKelligon, Borowski, Casey, and Creelman were able to attend. In addition, Kiwanians Gary Christensen from East Sac and Jack Siegal from Rancho Murieta, (who both served with Rick at KFH) were also there. Rick was a man of many talents who will be greatly missed by our club, KFH, and the many other non-profits to which he lent those talents over the years. I'll never forget that gravelly laugh. Loved ya, Rick, Creelman.



The six permanent Objects of Kiwanis International were approved by Kiwanis club delegates at the 1924 Kiwanis International Convention in Denver, Colorado. Through the decades, they have remained unchanged.

- To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.
- To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business and professional standards.
- To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.
- To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service and to build better communities.
- To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and goodwill.



Division Inter-Club Meetings

Inter-Club: An inter-club meeting is a meeting or activity staged by two or more Kiwanis family clubs including Division Council Meetings, Kiwanis Club, Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids, Aktion Club, Conferences & Conventions.

The definition of an inter-club was expanded from simply attending another Kiwanis club meeting to include attending Fundraisers, Projects, Activities and Social Events of another K-Family Club.

The broadened definition promotes more opportunities for fellowship, education and encourages greater interaction between **Kiwanis Clubs and our Service Leadership Programs**:

- Clubs with 20 or Fewer Members need a minimum of <u>two</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 21-30 of three members need a minimum of three members attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of <u>four</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.

Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.

Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting **Kiwanis' Fifth Object**, which is "**To provide**, **through this club**, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community".

Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.
