The students routinely have found this as an enriching experience that has often initiated long time friendships.

Our own Kent Casey attended Boys State in Florida and NBA legend, Michael Jordan also attended Boys State as a youth.

The students that spoke to us were Catie Burnett (Mira Loma High School), Surina Naran (Rio Americano High School), Titilope (TT) Oluto (Mira Loma High School) and Trevor Frank (Rio Americano High School). Catie ran for Energy Commissioner and decided to major in Environmental Science in college. She described this as a very enriching experience. Surina ran for a couple offices and did not win, but said that she learned a lot about herself and was happy to have met many wonderful people. She said that her city was named the most spirited city. TT was overwhelmed by meeting accomplished people from around the state. She ran for and was elected as an Assemblywoman. She worked on a healthcare bill that passed. The City of Citrus Heights City Council honored our club's 50th Anniversary at its September 22 meeting. Our club has raised and contributed over \$1 million to the Citrus Heights community since 1972.

Our annual Crab Feed will be held on February 10 at 7pm at the Citrus Heights Community Center. The Crab Feed, which will celebrate its 37th year, will feature a live auction, a silent auction, a wine raffle, pourings of high-end wines, beer, and spirits, and...of course...crab and shrimp dishes. Admission will be available at \$70 per person and \$650 per table. Members of our high school Key Clubs will aid us in setting up and conducting the silent and live auctions.

Jayson Thompson, Veronica Hunter, Katie and Edd Escajeda, Louise and Vernon Brown, Cindy Fleming, Steve Anderson, Tom Steadman, Amanda Subia, and Larry Viegas attended the first organizational meeting.

Kiwanis Family House Board member Vernon Brown reported that the House recently focused on these two issues:

- Safety and appearance: Volunteers have raked leaves, spread wood chips, and sprayed for weeds; moved old electronic items to the e-waste storage for later disposal; painted rooms and hung new curtains; met with the UCD Fire Marshal to discuss storage issues where electric panels are located. And Citrus Heights member Edd Escajeda, who works for Kitchen Mart, installed in the RV bathroom solid surface material that Kitchen Mart donated.
- The future of the House: The Board met on October 29th and discussed the viability of the House and if they want it "to exist or to grow". Simply existing as it is currently isn't an option; it needs to grow, not in physical size, but by increasing funding to sustain the facility and staff. The pandemic had serious financial effects on the House because sponsor clubs were not able to sustain their giving and the House lost over 40 sponsoring clubs. Executive Director Paula Kelly is working to rebuild the lost funding by applying for grants and speaking at meetings of the past sponsoring clubs. In addition, the Board Members will be tasked to seek additional funding sources and use their community connections to encourage new funding sources.

Thousands of Key Clubbers from across the Cal-Nev-Ha district thronged to Fall Rally North on October 22. About 60 key clubbers from Division 44 West attended, of which roughly half were from our Mesa Verde and Center Key Clubs. D44W won 2nd place in the spirit session competition!

At the Citrus Heights PALs Trunk or Treat on October 26, our President Ben Middleton and members of the Mesa Verde Key Club were superheroes handing out candy to about 3,500 people at this annual Halloween event.

Working with Citrus Heights HART on October 29 to collect new and gently used winter coats for San Juan Unified School District students and families were Evan SooHoo, Ben Middleton, Jayson Thompson (serving as the photographer) and the Mesa Verde Key Club. These coats will be available at the Underground Clothing Connection for families in need.





It took three pickup truck loads to transport the 1.3 tons of food to the food bank.







Division Inter-Club Meetings

Inter-Club: An inter-club meeting is a meeting or activity staged by two or more Kiwanis family clubs including Division Council Meetings, Kiwanis Club, Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids, Aktion Club, Conferences & Conventions.

The definition of an inter-club was expanded from simply attending another Kiwanis club meeting to include attending Fundraisers, Projects, Activities and Social Events of another K-Family Club.

The broadened definition promotes more opportunities for fellowship, education and encourages greater interaction between **Kiwanis Clubs and our Service Leadership Programs**:

- Clubs with 20 or Fewer Members need a minimum of <u>two</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 21-30 of three members need a minimum of three members attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of <u>four</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.

Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.

Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting Kiwanis' Fifth Object, which is "To provide, through this club, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community".

Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.
