Roseville Kiwanian Elected to Lt. Governor Position Over 14 Northern California Clubs

September 2024 - Brian McLean, a member of the Kiwanis Club of Roseville, will be installed as the Lt. Governor of Division 44 of the International Kiwanis Club. The installation of McLean from Lt. Governor-elect to Lt. Governor will take place at the Kiwanis Division Committee meeting on September 16th.

McLean first joined the Kiwanis Club of Rancho Cordova on April 16, 1983, and served as treasurer, secretary and president during his 15 years with that club. In 1998, he transferred to the Kiwanis Club of Roseville and has served as a director as well as



Distinguished Club Secretary multiple times and as Distinguished Club President twice. In 2005, he was awarded the George F. Hixon Fellow Award for outstanding service.

Currently, Division 44 has 14 Clubs. Kiwanis Clubs of: Auburn, Carmichael, Citrus Heights, Folsom Lake, Gold Country, Lincoln, Lincoln Foothills, Placerville, Rancho Cordova, Rancho Murieta, Roseville, Sacramento Suburban, Orangevale-Fair Oaks and El Dorado Hills.

As Lt. Governor, McLean will be working with all the clubs on ways to improve their main mission of serving the children of the community. The Kiwanis Club of Roseville was chartered on June 22, 1949. In its 75 years of existence,

McLean is the first Roseville member to become Lt. Governor of Division 44. To celebrate its 75th year, this past June, the Kiwanis Club of Roseville gifted \$75,000 to 15 Roseville area service and charity organizations serving children and families with a \$5,000 check to each.

The Kiwanis Club of Roseville meets every Thursday at the Pacific Street Café in Old Roseville for a noon luncheon and all who may be interested in joining the club are welcome to attend.

Twenty-nine Students at Kaseberg and Woodbridge Elementary schools in Roseville were gifted new bicycles by the Kiwanis Club of Roseville. Michelle McLean, who sparked the ides, said," This project will give a child whose family may not be able to financially provide a bike for them,

a chance to earn a bike by being kind, caring, and respectful to students and staff. The Principal at Woodbridge Elementary School said, "I think that our community-school partnership is really important for our schools." Ton of See's Fundraising Candy Arrives in Roseville

Funding for Kids in Need and Servicemembers Overseas

The Christmas season has officially begun with the delivery of nearly one ton of candy to the Kiwanis Club of Roseville. Every Christmas, the Kiwanians of Roseville order in their supply of See's Candy to sell to support children's programs in Roseville and service members serving their country overseas.

This year's Kiwanian Fundraising store is located at 1070 Pleasant Grove Boulevard, Suite #150, next to the local Safeway store at the corner of Pleasant Grove Blvd and Roseville Parkway. The store is open from 10 to 6 daily from November 23rd until the candy runs out about December 23rd.

"That means," said Kiwanian Ted Smith, "that since there is always a large demand to support this effort, it would be wise to get to the store early in the season to make sure you get what you want."

As an example of a program helping young people in the community, this year, the Kiwanis Club of Roseville raised over \$18,000 for scholarships for senior high school students headed for college. In addition, the Club supports community food programs, cancer treatment organizations, aged out foster children, Girl and Boy Scouts, Police Activities League, A Touch of Understanding and the Kiwanis Family House at UC Davis Medical Center.

"Our entire goal," said Kiwanis President Mike March, "is to make a positive different in the lives of children and parents who have special needs. So, we strongly encourage people to buy a box or two of the best candy on the planet to support our youth and our servicemembers overseas to let them know that their community is thinking of them and backing them all the way until they are safely home again."

This past June, the Club celebrated its 75th Anniversary by giving \$75.000 to 15 community groups that help those in need with each group receiving a \$5,000 check.







They focus on five under served youth populations, college bound students, young proteges, human trafficking survivors, NICU families and pediatric cancer patients.

This year 12 local high schools are involved. New campaign will use innovative fundraising ideas with the local focus being pediatric cancer families, in collaboration with Keaton's Childhood Cancer Alliance. They are also in need of local businesses to help with matching funds.

The group will furnish the club members with QR codes for each of the local high schools. The team members will be visiting the schools in person to promote donations on the various campus locations. Division Inter-Club Meetings

Inter-Club: An inter-club meeting is a meeting or activity staged by two or more Kiwanis family clubs including Division Council Meetings, Kiwanis Club, Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids, Aktion Club, Conferences & Conventions.

The definition of an inter-club was expanded from simply attending another Kiwanis club meeting to include attending Fundraisers, Projects, Activities and Social Events of another K-Family Club.

The broadened definition promotes more opportunities for fellowship, education and encourages greater interaction between **Kiwanis Clubs and our Service Leadership Programs**:

- Clubs with 20 or Fewer Members need a minimum of <u>two</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 21-30 of three members need a minimum of three members attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of <u>four</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.

Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.

Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting **Kiwanis' Fifth Object**, which is "**To provide**, **through this club**, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community".

Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.

- 3. To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business and professional standards.
- 4. To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.
- 5. To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service and to build better communities.
- 6. To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and goodwill.

Structure of Kiwanis

Club Level

It all starts with members in a club. Every club has a few things in common. For example, clubs have a president, vice president(s), secretary, and treasurer. Clubs may also have other leadership positions, such as committee chairs.

Division Level

Each club is clustered together with clubs in the area to form a division. Divisions are overseen by a lieutenant governor, who is a representative of the district board (see "District" category below). The number of divisions and lieutenant governors varies by district.

District Level

A district is made up of several divisions. There are currently 49 districts and provisional districts within Kiwanis International. Some include only one state (example: Kansas District) or country (example: Malaysia District), while others are made up of multiple states (example: Minnesota-Dakotas District) or countries (example: Switzerland-Liechtenstein District). The rest are made up of geographical regions (example: Pacific Northwest District).

Each district is led by a governor who is elected with the rest of the executive board at the district's annual convention. The district's executive board includes a governor, secretary, and treasurer (or combined secretary-treasurer). Other board positions include the lieutenant governors and district chairs.

International Level

All 49 districts and provisional districts, as well as Kiwanis nations that do not fit into any district, make up Kiwanis International. Currently, there are Kiwanis clubs in approximately 80 countries and geographic territories.

Each year, delegates at the Kiwanis International convention elect members and officers of the Kiwanis International Board, which includes a president, president-elect, vice president, past president and 15 trustees. The trustees work with the districts, similar to how lieutenant governors work with divisions.
