Kiwanis STAR Update 05/04/2025

We're pleased to update you on our activities at Kiwanis STAR (Sex Trafficking Awareness and Resources). As a refresher, we formed this club in 2023, so we have been meeting for about 17 months now – and it's been a very busy 17 months! We have partnered with four organizations that are also fighting child sex trafficking: 3Strands Global Foundation (focused on education/prevention programs); Thorn (a non-profit technology company focused on software solutions to assist law enforcement in arresting trafficking criminals, reducing internet recruiting and locating/rescuing trafficked individuals and the internet threats to our children including trafficking recruitment); OLIVE (a home for rescued women focused on rehabilitation) and CALTIPA (California Trafficking Investigators and Prosecutors Association focused on improved communication, cooperation between law enforcement agencies, training and best practices). Our club membership includes other clubs (as corporate members); concerned Kiwanians (personally, I'm a member of two Kiwanis clubs); leaders from our partner organizations; and representatives from local law enforcement agencies.

BJ's Restaurant Fundraiser: We had a very successful fundraiser at BJ's Restaurants in Roseville and Folsom. Thank you to some of our fellow Kiwanis Clubs who came out to support us and enjoy a Pizookie!

<u>Backpacks</u>: We have provided the Sacramento Police Department with backpacks filled with toiletries, a change of clothes, personal items and a note of encouragement for young girls and women that are rescued by law enforcement officers. Often these girls have nothing when they are rescued.

<u>CALTIPA</u>: We provided some of the initial seed money to get CALTIPA started and have committed to support them as they develop and implement law enforcement training and best practices throughout California.

Kiwanis STAR Foundation: We formed a 501(c)(3) foundation as a mechanism to raise funds.

<u>Satellite Clubs:</u> We have two satellite clubs forming, one in Monterey County and one in Los Angeles County. Like the greater Sacramento region, these areas are hot-spots for child trafficking. Our Monterey County Kiwanians have also provided 50 backpacks to their local law enforcement agency.

<u>Membership:</u> We added two new members to our club – Kelly Pena, President of the Literacy Club of Southern California and Muriel Brounstein, the first female Lieutenant Governor for our District!

<u>3Strands Global PROTECT prevention program:</u> We are in the process of developing a "how to kit" for Kiwanis Clubs and Key Clubs throughout CAL/NEV/HA that can be used to start and fund local efforts with our schools to implement the PROTECT education and prevention program for our youth. California schools have a legislative mandate to provide trafficking prevention education, but it is an unfunded mandate.

How can you join the fight to eradicate child sex trafficking?


- 1. Your club can introduce the state-approved PROTECT trafficking prevention program to your local school administrators and offer to fund it. The commitment is manageable and the impact is significant about \$1 per student; and \$30 per school administrator. Your club probably already has a Key Club or Builder's Club that you sponsor at your local school.\
- 2. Your club can support Kiwanis STAR Foundation financially either directly (as part of your annual budget) or by supporting one of our fundraising events. Thank you Citrus Heights for allowing us to raise money by serving during your Crab Feed!
- 3. Your club can become a corporate member of Kiwanis STAR, or you can join. (I belong to two clubs myself: Placerville Kiwanis and Kiwanis STAR). Kiwanis STAR meets once a month via ZOOM.
- 4. Invite us to come to your club as a guest speaker. We'll probably bring a partner with us. We'll share with your club about the enormity of the problem of child sex trafficking and how our children are vulnerable. This is a local problem not an "over there" problem. We'll also share practical ways that Kiwanians can respond and rise to the challenge.

He walked 2,167 miles, across 14 states, and it took him four and one-half months, during which he endured 120 mile per hour winds. He showed us pictures of many other walks he's taken, including the John Muir Trail (211 miles), the Colorado Trail (500 miles), and the Tahoe Rim Trail (165 miles).

Our Kiwanians had lots of questions. What about food and water? He said family and friends bring food packages to pre-arranged locations. About water, he said, each day he "camel's up," meaning drinking 1 to 2 liters of water before starting and bringing 1 liter with him. Okay, who's ready to go with Adam? Take a look at the logo on the top left. He is the operator of the Alpine Adventure Coaching Company and can be hired to tell you how to do it. Are you ready? Adam is a lifelong friend of our Kiwanian John DeLury and his wife Jane and they brought him to our luncheon.





River City Waterway Alliance's goal is to make Arcade Creek more habitable for salmon.

In February, the Mesa Verde Key Club was super-busy. They worked at a wrestling tournament, participated in Read Across America Day at Carriage Elementary, helped at Carriage's Math Night, served food at a race in Placer County; set up and served food at a Veterans Luau in Roseville.







At our March meeting, Shanna Lowder from A Touch of Understanding was our guest speaker. Its volunteers provide disability awareness workshops in 109 schools in 10 counties. The program has been especially effective in 3rd through 5th grades, and it recently has expanded to 9th grade. ATOU uses wheelchairs, white disability canes, tablets for writing in Braille, prosthetic and orthotic devices, "dark meals", and special headphones which simulate autism to have kids experience disabilities so they can be accepting and respectful in real situations. A Touch of Understanding does not track students to gauge the long-term effects of the program, but teachers, parents, and the students themselves report its successes.

At the October meeting of our club, President Katie Escajeda introduced guest speaker Fia Nicolaescu, Co-President of the Bella Vista Key Club. We funded her attendance at the November 11-13 Student Advisory Board on Education Conference at which students present educational reform proposals to the California State Board of Education. On March 14, gave us this news: "I was just elected CA Association of Student Councils statewide education policy director, meaning I now run the conference that Kiwanis sponsored me for!" Not surprising, given the strength of her proposal to offer career education alternatives at the middle school level.



Treasurer report

Per Treasurer Jim:

Did you know that the Sacramento Suburban Kiwanis Club doesn't exist? Actually, that is our "nick name." We are legally the Kiwanis Club of Sacramento Suburban (KCoSS). We are a non-profit but not a charity. This is how we fund our administrative expenses.

KCoSS income is from dues, happy & sad bucks, and currently two admin fundraisers, the Holiday Food Auction and the Planetarium. Major expenses coming out of the KCoSS account are Kiwanis International and California Nevada Hawaii District Dues, program/speaker lunches, membership committee (guests, awards, etc.), support for members attending conferences/conventions, support for the Lt governor, website, tax prep, etc. The KCoSS has one checking account with a normal balance of \$10K-\$20K.

Then we have the Sacramento Suburban Kiwanis Foundation (SSKF). It is a charitable organization under the tax code section 501c3. That means donations may be tax deductible.

The SSKF funds all our community service activities and has considerable resources, with a current net worth of over \$280K, due to the generosity of past donors. Most of those funds have some restrictions requested by the donor. Our major SSKF fundraiser (and currently only fundraiser) is the Art Fiesta.

- Physical injuries or signs of abuse
- Lying about age/false identification and/or inconsistencies
- Appear scared or nervous, may not make eye contact
- Lack of knowledge about where they are and why
- Signs of psychological trauma and abuse; anxiety, depression, thoughts of suicide, panic attacks, or lack of emotion (flat affect)
- Typically has someone with them at all times, this person may seem controlling

Division Inter-Club Meetings

Inter-Club: An inter-club meeting is a meeting or activity staged by two or more Kiwanis family clubs including Division Council Meetings, Kiwanis Club, Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids, Aktion Club, Conferences & Conventions.

The definition of an inter-club was expanded from simply attending another Kiwanis club meeting to include attending Fundraisers, Projects, Activities and Social Events of another K-Family Club.

The broadened definition promotes more opportunities for fellowship, education and encourages greater interaction between **Kiwanis Clubs and our Service Leadership Programs**:

- Clubs with 20 or Fewer Members need a minimum of <u>two</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 21-30 of three members need a minimum of three members attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of <u>four</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.

Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.

Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting **Kiwanis' Fifth Object**, which is "**To provide**, **through this club**, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community".

Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.

Traditional and Not: No two Kiwanis clubs look exactly the same. Each member's and community's needs are different, and each club should look different. Some clubs are very traditional, with weekly meetings and a strong sense of history. Other clubs don't meet at all, and instead hold meetings online and only come together for service projects. Newer clubs may follow the 3-2-1 concept: 3 hours of service, 2 hours of social activity and a 1-hour meeting each month. Clubs should reflect their communities and their members and should work to meet their needs. Flexibility is key to a successful club.

Fellowship and Fun: Kiwanis members don't just do service—they have fun. Members make new friends by being part of a club where they attend meetings and participate in social events. Kiwanis clubs also provide excellent networking opportunities for professionals. Members meet new people from all over their region and the world through service projects, fundraising and by attending district and Kiwanis International conventions.

Structure of Kiwanis

Club Level

It all starts with members in a club. Every club has a few things in common. For example, clubs have a president, vice president(s), secretary, and treasurer. Clubs may also have other leadership positions, such as committee chairs.

Division Level

Each club is clustered together with clubs in the area to form a division. Divisions are overseen by a lieutenant governor, who is a representative of the district board (see "District" category below). The number of divisions and lieutenant governors varies by district.

District Level

A district is made up of several divisions. There are currently 49 districts and provisional districts within Kiwanis International. Some include only one state (example: Kansas District) or country (example: Malaysia District), while others are made up of multiple states (example: Minnesota-Dakotas District) or countries (example: Switzerland-Liechtenstein District). The rest are made up of geographical regions (example: Pacific Northwest District).

Each district is led by a governor who is elected with the rest of the executive board at the district's annual convention. The district's executive board includes a governor, secretary, and treasurer (or combined secretary-treasurer). Other board positions include the lieutenant governors and district chairs.

International Level

All 49 districts and provisional districts, as well as Kiwanis nations that do not fit into any district, make up Kiwanis International. Currently, there are Kiwanis clubs in approximately 80 countries and geographic territories.

Each year, delegates at the Kiwanis International convention elect members and officers of the Kiwanis International Board, which includes a president, president-elect, vice president, past president and 15 trustees. The trustees work with the districts, similar to how lieutenant governors work with divisions.
