Obituary: Herman Kramer (1931-2025)

Herman Kramer, a devoted husband, father, trailblazing financial planner, veteran of the United States Air Force, and passionate global traveler, passed away peacefully on June 1, 2025, in Sacramento, California. He was 93.

Born on August 16, 1931, in Baltimore, Maryland, Herman's early life reflected the foundation of discipline and ambition that would define his path. He attended the historic and prestigious Baltimore City College for high school, followed by pre-law studies at the University of Baltimore. In 1951, he answered the call to serve his country, enlisting in the U.S. Air Force and spending several formative years stationed across Europe, including Wiesbaden, Germany, and Travis Air Force Base in California. Remarkably, he was in Rome, Italy, on March 5, 1953, the day Joseph Stalin died—an event that deeply impacted the global landscape he would later explore.

After his military service, Herman earned a business management degree with a minor in industrial management from Boston University in 1958. He entered the financial industry during its formative years, where he became a pioneering force. In 1973, he was part of the inaugural class to earn the Certified Financial Planner™ designation. As a respected voice in the field, he delivered the commitment speech for that first graduating class, a moment he always held with great pride. His influence extended to academia, teaching financial planning at Villanova University and later delivering a memorable commencement address at Santa Clara College, anchored by the phrase: "If it is to be, it is up to me"—a ten-letter mantra that captured his enduring belief in personal responsibility and empowerment.

In 1996, Herman married Carole Sacré. Together, they made their home in Rancho Murieta, California, and enjoyed an extraordinary life enriched by travel, family, and shared purpose. They split their time between their beach condo in Rosarito Beach, their mountain home in Lake Tahoe, and their Rancho Murieta residence. Their travels took them around the world—from the alpine beauty of Austria and Germany to the rugged wonders of Alaska, the mysterious Galápagos, and the cultural richness of Argentina and Peru.

Herman lived with intention, always looking ahead and always committed to excellence in everything he did. Whether in service to his country, shaping the future of financial planning, mentoring students, or simply enjoying the sunrise from a beach or mountaintop, he brought intelligence, warmth, and unwavering curiosity to every chapter of his life.

He leaves behind his beautiful wife Carole, daughter and son in law Jenny and Matthew Niello and grandchildren Ryan Niello and Caroline Niello.

Additionally, he leaves a legacy of vision, service, and deep personal integrity. He will be profoundly missed by all who knew and loved him.

A gifted athlete in his youth, John spent his childhood playing baseball and was even recruited to play in the minor leagues. **John** met the love of his life, **Julie Starr**, in high school. They married shortly after graduation and shared 48 wonderful years together.

In 1974, **John** began his career in the Telecom industry as a part-time
Telephone Operator for GTE in Los Gatos, CA. Within a short period of time he transferred to the Sacramento area. He steadily advanced through the years, holding positions of splicer, lineman, and engineer, ultimately retiring as a Sr. Engineering Manager after 49 years of service.

In addition to the strong dedication **John** had to his career and supporting his family, he served his community through his church and coaching youth sports. He was an incredibly supportive father to his son and daughter, lifting them up and cheering them on through all of their academic, extracurricular, and adult pursuits.

In 2003, **John** and **Julie** moved to the Rancho Murieta community, where they became proud owners of the local Ace Hardware. Still pursuing his career, **John** was behind the scenes managing the business, while **Julie** was and continues to manage the day-to-day operations.

John was an amazing gardener, building beautiful outdoor spaces in every home in which he and **Julie** lived. Never one to shy away from a challenge, **John** most recently completed a custom home build with breathtaking views in lone, California. This 40-acre project turned haven has become a cherished gathering place for family and friends.

John had a gift for bringing people together. Whether sharing a meal or a glass of wine, telling one of his signature "*Papa jokes*," playing ping pong with his grandchildren, or competing in a spirited card game, he filled every room with warmth and laughter. His generosity, curiosity, and kindhearted nature left a lasting impression on all who knew him.

John is survived by his beloved wife, Julie; son, Bryan, daughter, Carrie Ann and daughter-in-law, Carrie Jean; grandchildren, Charlie, Avery, and William; and siblings, Joyce, Gloria, and Mike; mother-in-law, Grace; siblings-in-law, Michael, Kevin, Phil, Christine, Mary, David, Dave, Sharon, Janet, Chris, Kevin, and Katie; as well as many nieces and nephews. John is predeceased by his son-in-law, Brian Dodson.

John will be deeply missed and forever remembered for the love and joy he brought into the lives of others.

A Celebration of Life was held on Saturday, June 28, at 11:00 a.m. at the Rancho Murieta Community Church.

San Juan USD named our club again as a Most Valued Partner at the awards ceremony held at the Aerospace Museum on May 21. Roger Klausler and Bradley Miller were there to receive the award.

During a social on May 28 with the Mesa Verde Key Club at Leatherby's, Miriam Belharma presented a thank-you card to Bradley Miller in appreciation for our club's scholarship award to her.







Five of our seven college scholarship winners attended our May 21 evening meeting. Shown are Zahra Akbari from Center, Aaron Thompson, Tyler Nguyen, Julia Clauson, Diego Barragar from Bella Vista, and Key Club Advisors Roger Klausler and Bradley Miller.

Guest speaker April West spoke about Fire Camps that have been held in June for 27 years. Most of the camp counselors are former Fire Campers. Eighty kids ages 11, 12, and 13 learn CPR, lithium battery and electrical safety, and how to call 911 effectively. They get to climb a 105-foot ladder and have AED and water rescue training. Through these activities, the kids learn the value of teamwork and build their self-confidence. April said that 70% of their calls are medical-related. 

Habitat For Humanity held a ground-breaking ceremony on June 2 for its project on Sayonara Drive. The eight homes in this section will be the first phase of a 26-home housing project costing \$8 million, the largest development in our region. Construction on eight additional homes is anticipated to begin in the fall of 2026, and construction on the remaining 10 homes should start in 2027.

Once described as the most dangerous street in the city, Sayonara Drive has two rows of vacant lots after the city purchased blighted buildings from absentee landlords and leveled them more than a decade ago. The 26 new single-family homes will be owned, not rented. Buyers will be required to contribute 500 hours of "sweat equity" during the construction of their homes.

President Katie presented to Leah Miller, President and CEO of Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento, a check in the amount of \$5,000 to supplement the \$25,000 that we had donated previously.


Ms. Miller gave special recognition to Congressman Ami Bera. He has represented Sacramento County in the U.S. House of Representatives since 2013 and secured \$1.05 million in Community Project Funding for Phase 1 of the Sayonara Project. 





Division Inter-Club Meetings

Inter-Club: An inter-club meeting is a meeting or activity staged by two or more Kiwanis family clubs including Division Council Meetings, Kiwanis Club, Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids, Aktion Club, Conferences & Conventions.

The definition of an inter-club was expanded from simply attending another Kiwanis club meeting to include attending Fundraisers, Projects, Activities and Social Events of another K-Family Club.

The broadened definition promotes more opportunities for fellowship, education and encourages greater interaction between **Kiwanis Clubs and our Service Leadership Programs**:

- Clubs with 20 or Fewer Members need a minimum of <u>two</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 21-30 of three members need a minimum of three members attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of <u>four</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.

Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.

Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting **Kiwanis' Fifth Object**, which is "**To provide**, **through this club**, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community".

Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.

Traditional and Not: No two Kiwanis clubs look exactly the same. Each member's and community's needs are different, and each club should look different. Some clubs are very traditional, with weekly meetings and a strong sense of history. Other clubs don't meet at all, and instead hold meetings online and only come together for service projects. Newer clubs may follow the 3-2-1 concept: 3 hours of service, 2 hours of social activity and a 1-hour meeting each month. Clubs should reflect their communities and their members and should work to meet their needs. Flexibility is key to a successful club.

Kiwanis clubs also provide excellent networking opportunities for professionals. - 6. To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and goodwill.

Structure of Kiwanis

Club Level

It all starts with members in a club. Every club has a few things in common. For example, clubs have a president, vice president(s), secretary, and treasurer. Clubs may also have other leadership positions, such as committee chairs.

Division Level

Each club is clustered together with clubs in the area to form a division. Divisions are overseen by a lieutenant governor, who is a representative of the district board (see "District" category below). The number of divisions and lieutenant governors varies by district.

District Level

A district is made up of several divisions. There are currently 49 districts and provisional districts within Kiwanis International. Some include only one state (example: Kansas District) or country (example: Malaysia District), while others are made up of multiple states (example: Minnesota-Dakotas District) or countries (example: Switzerland-Liechtenstein District). The rest are made up of geographical regions (example: Pacific Northwest District).

Each district is led by a governor who is elected with the rest of the executive board at the district's annual convention. The district's executive board includes a governor, secretary, and treasurer (or combined secretary-treasurer). Other board positions include the lieutenant governors and district chairs.

International Level

All 49 districts and provisional districts, as well as Kiwanis nations that do not fit into any district, make up Kiwanis International. Currently, there are Kiwanis clubs in approximately 80 countries and geographic territories.

Each year, delegates at the Kiwanis International convention elect members and officers of the Kiwanis International Board, which includes a president, president-elect, vice president, past president and 15 trustees. The trustees work with the districts, similar to how lieutenant governors work with divisions.
