Kiwanians Learn How to Reduce Food Waste and Nourish Communities

September 11, 2025 -- Many of the Kiwanians at our September 8, 2025 luncheon looked at each other and said, "I have never heard of that before." That's because in Roseville and Placer County, it is one of the first pilot programs in the state to begin a unique program to help those with food needs.

The picture at right shows Kiwanis of Roseville President Mike March welcoming Janeane Martin, Environmental Resource specialist with Placer County, and Dan Lombardi, Waste Services Field Enforcement Inspector for the city of Roseville, as the guest speakers of our Thursday luncheon meeting.

The program they described is called EatWell. Martin told members that Senate Bill 1383 mandated it. It requires food generators, like grocery stores and restaurants of a certain size, to recover the maximum amount of edible food that would otherwise



be disposed of and wasted. She said people with nutritional needs, must show they are in that situation and then they can sign up. Said Marrtin, everyday restaurants and grocery stores dispose of food they can no longer sell, but is still perfectly good, and this program puts it to a good use for those in need.

For the food generators, it is tax deductible while reducing waste and supporting community members in need. How does it work? See below.

How EatWell works:

- Step one: Community-based organization partners will issue a code to community members in need.
- Step two: The food generator with unsold food will post it on the EatWell app.
- **Step three:** The community member receives a notification when food is available in their area.
- **Step four:** The community member will "claim" the food on the app and collect it within a specified time frame.

The Evolution of Money from Seashells to Crypto

October 2, 2025 - We learned on this day that one Bitcoin is worth \$119,000. Yes, just one and just this week, that evaluation increased by \$10,000. The message on Bitcoin came from Kiwanian Mike Herbert and his friend and fellow Bitcoin enthusiast Ken Turner. In our weekly luncheon, Herbert and Turner said you can use a Bitcoin credit card anywhere you can use a normal credit card. We also learned that in 2021, just 15% of Americans owned Bitcoin. But in 2024, that figure had expanded to 40%. Bitcoin is said to be both a currency and an investment. And speaking of investments, if you have



shares in the S&P Market, you likely have money in Bitcoin, because S&P is invested in Bitcoin. Herbert and Turner said more and more people like it because it transfers faster and cheaper, with a speed and efficiency far greater than money. As for ownership, you don't need to buy one Bitcoin for \$119,000, you can buy small amounts of one coin and build your investment.





Division Inter-Club Meetings

Inter-Club: An inter-club meeting is a meeting or activity staged by two or more Kiwanis family clubs including Division Council Meetings, Kiwanis Club, Circle K, Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids, Aktion Club, Conferences & Conventions.

The definition of an inter-club was expanded from simply attending another Kiwanis club meeting to include attending Fundraisers, Projects, Activities and Social Events of another K-Family Club.

The broadened definition promotes more opportunities for fellowship, education and encourages greater interaction between **Kiwanis Clubs and our Service Leadership Programs**:

- Clubs with 20 or Fewer Members need a minimum of <u>two</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 21-30 of three members need a minimum of three members attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.
- Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of <u>four</u> members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.

Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.

Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting **Kiwanis' Fifth Object**, which is "**To provide**, **through this club**, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community".

Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.

Structure of Kiwanis

Club Level

It all starts with members in a club. Every club has a few things in common. For example, clubs have a president, vice president(s), secretary, and treasurer. Clubs may also have other leadership positions, such as committee chairs.

Division Level

Each club is clustered together with clubs in the area to form a division. Divisions are overseen by a lieutenant governor, who is a representative of the district board (see "District" category below). The number of divisions and lieutenant governors varies by district.

District Level

A district is made up of several divisions. There are currently 49 districts and provisional districts within Kiwanis International. Some include only one state (example: Kansas District) or country (example: Malaysia District), while others are made up of multiple states (example: Minnesota-Dakotas District) or countries (example: Switzerland-Liechtenstein District). The rest are made up of geographical regions (example: Pacific Northwest District).

Each district is led by a governor who is elected with the rest of the executive board at the district's annual convention. The district's executive board includes a governor, secretary, and treasurer (or combined secretary-treasurer). Other board positions include the lieutenant governors and district chairs.

International Level

All 49 districts and provisional districts, as well as Kiwanis nations that do not fit into any district, make up Kiwanis International. Currently, there are Kiwanis clubs in approximately 80 countries and geographic territories.

Each year, delegates at the Kiwanis International convention elect members and officers of the Kiwanis International Board, which includes a president, president-elect, vice president, past president and 15 trustees. The trustees work with the districts, similar to how lieutenant governors work with divisions.
