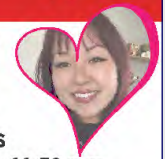

**Division 44 Lt. Governor  
Outlines Status of Division and District**



Sophia Cabrera, the Lt. Governor of Kiwanis Division 44, had a positive message for Kiwanians at the regular meeting of Kiwanis of Roseville on December 29, 2026.

Cabrera said División 44, 14 Kiwanis clubs in the South Placer and Sacramento counties region of Northern California, now has a total membership of 536, up twenty-one since October of last year.

As for the District, California-Nevada and Hawaii, Cabrera said there are now 8,733 members. She said since October of last year, 287 added new members have joined Kiwanis. The District has more than 400 clubs with more than 150,000 service projects and raises nearly \$100 million every year for communities, families and projects. That’s a wow!

Cabrera said the District is really doing well, having lost no members last year and having gained twenty-one new members. She added that all the clubs need new and younger members and that the District is beginning a new drive for members called “Kiwanis Voices.” She said it is a program targeting 18- to 26-year-old people with a reduced membership dues of just \$40.00 to be more attractive and affordable for younger people starting out in life. About the book, Cabrera said it is something all clubs should produce to show prospective members what their membership can do for their local community.

**Major Benefits Coming to Roseville from  
New Placer Valley Soccer Complex**

The headline tells the story Kiwanis of Roseville heard from Roseville Parks and Recreation Planning and Development Manager Tara Gee at its luncheon February 5. In the picture on the right, Gee is signing the guest speaker book as Kiwanis of Roseville President-elect Myla Herbert looks on.

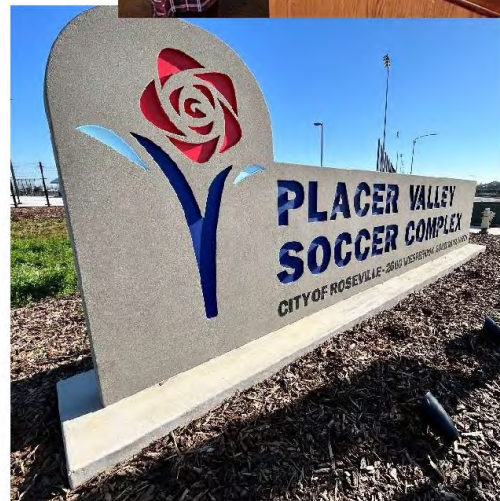
We all know that developments by our governments cost us tax money. Well, this is an example of a private-public venture that will bring visitors and revenue to the city and city businesses for years to come.

It is estimated that with soccer teams coming from all across the state for seasonal and tournament play, the park will generate about 5-million dollars per year in the form of revenue to hotels, restaurants, retail businesses and the city. That figure is based on 12 tournaments per year on the ten fields at the complex. Said Gee, at that rate we will pay off the construction costs in 4 years. She added that the fields will be an economic driver for our community for many years into the future.

About the city's park system in general, Gee said Roseville has a total of 94 parks at present and more than 4,000 acres of open space. She said the revenue for building new parks comes from home builders paying a development fee to build a park, with a tax in the new development area paying for maintenance on the park.

If you have not driven out to see it, 2600 Westbrook Blvd, the author of this newsletter, strongly suggests that you do so. It is a beautiful field with concession and snack bar shops within the field.

### South Placer Transit, the Bus Company, Shows You How, If You Need It

Wait? What does that mean?

Well, South Placer Transit Information and Education Official Faith McKinnie told the Kiwanis of Roseville gathering on February 12, that many people need public transit, but are totally intimidated with how to use it.

So, people call the Transit Company and one of the many educators in the system begin the help process, even going to them in their neighborhood. That's right, they go to that person's home or to a comfortable public spot and begin an educational process.

They start by explaining maps and schedules for the bus system. Then, with the destination the person has pinpointed, they literally get on the bus with them and show

them how to do it, including where they might have to transfer buses to continue their journey. And if they need to do it again to make sure the person really gets it, they do it a second or third time to make sure they fully understand the system and the route they need. Now that's a full-service bus company. They call it Travel Training. The purpose is to give confidence, independence and mobility. So, if you know someone who needs this, give them the scoop with the number (916) or (530) 745-7560.

After expenses and some put away in a rainy-day fund, just over \$67,000 was granted to more than 15 charities and help organizations in South Placer County.

Ahhhhhh, like the Southwest TV ad says, "Sometimes you just need to get away." We found a great way and place to do it last week. Spending four days, three nights on



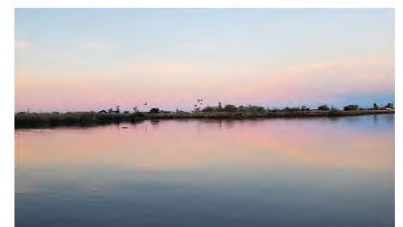

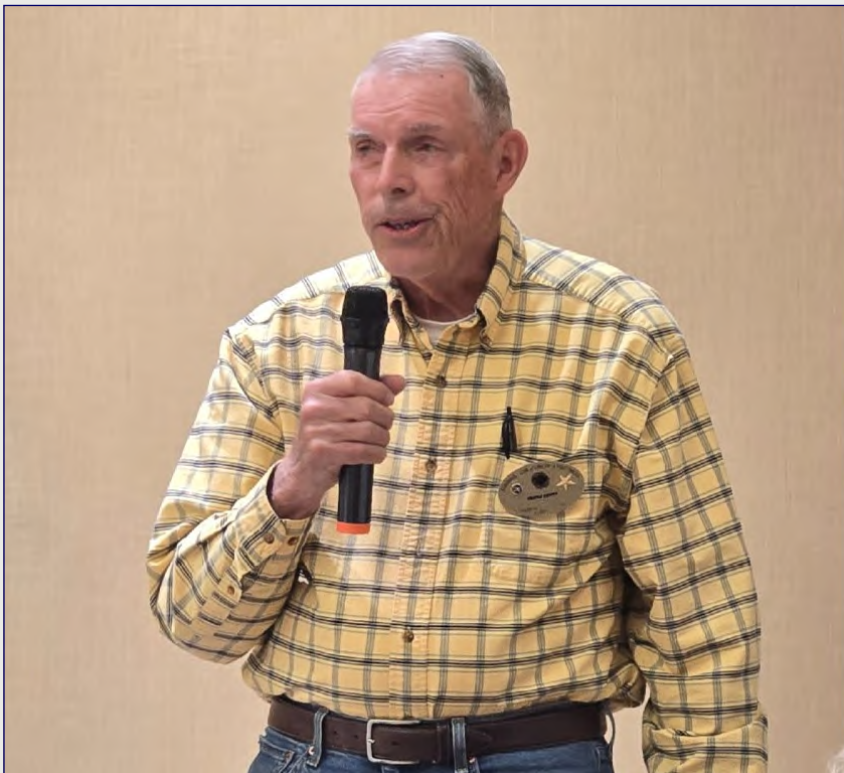

- *Clubs with 31 or More Members need a minimum of four members in attendance to constitute an Inter-Club Meeting.*

*Visiting groups shall be composed of a minimum of two Kiwanians plus members of K-Kids, Builders Club, Aktion Club, Circle K, or Key Club must be in attendance. A Lieutenant Governor can only be included if they are a member of the participating club.*

*Inter-Clubbing is a means of supporting Kiwanis' Fifth Object, which is "To provide, through this club, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build a better community".*

*Through the fellowship gained by inter-club activities, members learn how other clubs function, get to know their neighboring Kiwanians, develop new ideas and a broader interest in how Kiwanis operates, find new ideas for use in their own club, and become better Kiwanians.*

## *Structure of Kiwanis*

### *Club Level*

*It all starts with members in a club. Every club has a few things in common. For example, clubs have a president, vice president(s), secretary, and treasurer. Clubs may also have other leadership positions, such as committee chairs.*

### *Division Level*

*Each club is clustered together with clubs in the area to form a division. Divisions are overseen by a lieutenant governor, who is a representative of the district board (see "District" category below). The number of divisions and lieutenant governors varies by district.*

### *District Level*

*A district is made up of several divisions. There are currently 49 districts and provisional districts within Kiwanis International. Some include only one state (example: Kansas District) or country (example: Malaysia District), while others are made up of multiple states (example: Minnesota-Dakotas District) or countries (example: Switzerland-Liechtenstein District). The rest are made up of geographical regions (example: Pacific Northwest District).*

*Each district is led by a governor who is elected with the rest of the executive board at the district's annual convention. The district's executive board includes a governor, secretary, and treasurer (or combined secretary-treasurer). Other board positions include the lieutenant governors and district chairs.*

### *International Level*

*All 49 districts and provisional districts, as well as Kiwanis nations that do not fit into any district, make up Kiwanis International. Currently, there are Kiwanis clubs in approximately 80 countries and geographic territories.*

*Each year, delegates at the Kiwanis International convention elect members and officers of the Kiwanis International Board, which includes a president, president-elect, vice president, past president and 15 trustees. The trustees work with the districts, similar to how lieutenant governors work with divisions.*
