

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


A Message from the Governor

If your region has not yet had theirs, please make plans to attend, and bring as many club members as possible (see pages 12-13 for more information and registration). Our District Education Team has worked long and hard on their programs and I am sure you will come away from the event full of new ideas and renewed enthusiasm.

In December, I received word from Kiwanis International that the club in Laurel Mississippi may need a little help with their pancake breakfast event. So, Past Governor Patrice Cusimano, Trustees Marcel Lashover and Rogena Woods-Mitchell, and myself answered the call to help them out. Like true Kiwanians they needed no more help than "fly to the moon". They had everything choreographed to a "T". There were Key Club members galore doing the serving and cleanup, two large separate locations for the event, a giant sausage smoker, five rotating grills to do the cooking, volunteers from the community that became Kiwanians that day, a couple of national television personalities to lend a hand, and more than 2,000 Mississippians to eat every plate of sausage and pancake put before them. This was truly a Signature Project Extraordinaire, and I learned quite a few things that day. My hats off to Billy Taylor,



Rhonda Gilbert, Ralph Smith and all of the members of the Club for a wonderful Saturday in December. If you're ever in Laurel in December, check out this event, it will make you proud to be a Kiwanian.

Thanks to all of you who held Christmas parades, served food to the needy, rang the bell for Salvation Army, took children Christmas shopping, played Santa or supported him as an elf, reindeer, or Grinch, furnished gifts for Christmas morning, wrote cards and letters to the elderly and *improved* the World one child and one community at a time.

In order to get our Key Clubs up

and running after the pandemic, I sent each of our Lt. Governors a list of the Key Clubs in their division and the name of the sponsoring Kiwanis Club.

They were to contact the Key Club or contact the sponsoring club to see if they needed assistance reopening. If your club or Key Club did not get contacted let me know and I will send the list for your division. It is *imperative* that Kiwanis Clubs support their Service Leadership Programs.

CKI will hold their District Convention in Lafayette this year on February 18-19. If your city has a college or university, please contact the administration to explore the possibility of starting a new CKI club. If there is already a club, invite their members to attend a meeting, to join a service, or help in a fundraising event.

When you meet with your SLP members make sure they are aware of the Global Leadership Certificate. Key Club and CKI members can attend (for free) 39 courses on leadership to earn their certificate. Participants will take a deep dive into leadership topics such as: Connection, Inclusion, Empathy, Resilience, Self-awareness, Vision, Critical Thinking, Communication, Volunteerism, Civic Engagement and Change Agent. This program doesn't just help students stand out as a candidate for colleges/grad school, trade schools or employers — it helps them become a stronger leader and changemaker.

Your District Educational team will present at the Mid-Winter Regional Conventions ideas and proven methods to increase your club's population. Kim Champagne the Dis-

trict's Club Coach remains available to evaluate the operations of your club and suggest methods for improvement. Last, but not least, "little ole buttercup" (Rogena Woods-Mitchel) is going to help our organization build new clubs.

The Executive Director of the La.-Miss.-W. Tenn. District operates as its Executive Director, Secretary and Treasurer.

Qualifications:

- Resident of La.-Miss.-W. Tenn. District
- Four-year degree from an accredited university, preferably with a concentration on business, marketing, and or finance/ accounting

- Submit to and pass a drug test, background check, and any bonding requirements
- Working knowledge of social media platforms (e.g. website construction and maintenance, Facebook, Instagram) and possess exemplary computer skills (e.g. Word, Power Point, Excel, QuickBooks)

Responsibilities:

A. Executive Director

- Maintain with board approval all necessary insurance policies, bonding protection, warranties and contracts necessary for the operation of the District.
- Attend the following events: International Convention, International District Secretary Meeting, District Convention, Mid-Winter Conference, Executive Board Meetings, District Foundation Board Meetings, Lt. Governor Training, Key Club District Convention and Circle K District Convention.
- Schedule, organize and coordinate District Conventions and all other meetings that require hotel accommodations, food

service and speakers.

• Maintain the official master calendar for the District.

B. Secretary

- Assist the Governor and the Executive Board by maintaining, updating and protecting all district records, and archiving appropriate records.
- Manage and timely update the District directories, newsletters and social media platforms.
- Facilitate communication between Kiwanis International, the District officers and Committee Chairs, the clubs and their officers.
- Timely file all necessary reports with Kiwanis International, and any government agencies when applicable.

C. Treasurer

Greetings and Happy New Year from your District Foundation! We are here to assist and help our clubs in numerous ways such as Community Service Grants, SLP scholarships and leadership trainings, AED grants and recently, Disaster Relief Grants. In the wake of Hurricane Ida, the need to help affected communities remains. The District Foundation has Disaster Relief Grants available for up to \$1,500 to bring immediate relief into communities within our District, whenever a disaster strikes. With all of these ways the Foundation provides assistance, we need contri-

butions from our clubs and members to help pay it forward. This can be done by way of Annual Club Giving, endowments and Friends of the Foundation. The **Annual Club Giving campaign** begins each year on October 1 and ends on September 30. The District Foundation invites all Kiwanis clubs in the District to become a "club in good standing" with the District Foundation by donating a minimum amount of \$5.00 per member as of October 1 roster. This is a requirement in applying for a Community Service Grant.

Individual members may become a **Friend of the Foundation** with an annual tax-deductible donation of \$120 or monthly payments of \$10 (see page 17). As an added convenience, your "Friends" pledge may be set up as a recurring monthly or yearly charge on your credit card to maintain your status as a Friend of the Foundation for years to come! As a thank you for your contribution, you will receive a Friends of the Foundation lapel pin.

At our recent face-to-face District Foundation Board meeting, we are wanting to increase our communica-

tions with our clubs/members by having a greater presence on social media, emails and at Mid-Year Regional Conferences. Our focus is to reach out to our newest clubs and educate them on who we are and how we may assist. 


Aspire to Inspire: VOIDS

Westview Key Club Grows Operation Christmas Child

When Westview High School Key Club Advisor Seth Frields first brought the idea of students filling Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child boxes to club membership, he anticipated a response of around 15. By that Wednesday, 175 boxes were stacked in the halls of Westview waiting to be prepped for the next step in the process. First, Westview's donations went to an Atlanta, Georgia, processing plant of the North Carolina-based ministry that promotes the project. Then the bright red and green boxes filled with "things children will need and things they will want" were distributed around the world.

Last year, Frields and wife Areli filled a box and connected with a child in Paraguay as part of a ministry of their church at South Fulton Baptist. This year, he was challenged to consider making the opportunity available to Westview students.

When the anticipated 15 were grabbed on the first day by Key Club members, club organizers opened the opportunity schoolwide. Frields estimated that the total boxes collected went way beyond Key Club membership which totaled 20 and may have reached as high as 85 students participating.

The objective is for those filling the boxes to choose to fill for a boy or girl and then select an age range of 2-4 years old, 5-9 years old, or 10-14 years old. Toys and hygiene products must fit in the shoebox-sized box provided by Samaritan's Purse. Students could also include a completed "getting to know me" form and photos in the hopes of connecting later with the recipient.

Frields praised the Westview reaction, "We've got a bunch of really good kids. These kids have some big hearts." The final count of boxes totaled 183 at the completion of the project.

The boxes were then delivered to the River Fellowship Church, the collection point for the shoeboxes in the region. From Hammond, the boxes were set to a distribution center in Dallas for final shipment to developing nations overseas.

"Several years ago we had a representative of Samaritan's Purse present a program at one of our meetings and we learned of the tremendous amount of joy a simple shoebox full of surprises can mean to children who have very, very little. Without the shoeboxes,

This year, the Walmart Distribution Center in Robert also donated two pallets of food to the Kiwanis Food drive to augment the items collected. Members of the Hammond Garden Club also collected food for the drive and donated cash to help supplement the effort.

The Kiwanis Christmas Food Drive involves more than just Kiwanis members. Key Club members from St. Thomas Aquinas (STA) High School assisted in distributing the food requests and they along with members of the STA baseball team also helped with picking up the food left on doorsteps


