

2022-2023 Community Award Winners



Firefighter of the Year: Joshua Ashby

Nominated by the Kiwanis Club of Shreveport

Josh has been a firefighter and paramedic with the Bossier City Fire Department for over ten years. Josh has distinguished himself as a loyal and dedicated Firefighter/Paramedic and has on many occasions gone above and beyond the call of duty to the citizens and guests of his home city. Joshua was awarded the Citizen's life Saving Award for saving the life of three year old Easton Dempsey. While off duty, Josh and two others performed CPR on Dempsey after he was found on the bottom of a pool. Josh is an active member of Cypress Baptist Church and is devoted to his family, fellow Firefighters, and to his city.

Lawperson of the Year: Bry Layrisson Nominated by the Kiwanis Club of Ponchatoula

Bry began his career in law enforcement when he was just 18 years old and was hired as a police officer with the Ponchatoula Police Department after graduation. He has served in many law enforcement capacities such as patrol officer, Drug Prevention Officer, Narcotics Division Instructor, and Special Agent with the Attorney General's Office. He was elected Chief of Police in 2007 and continues thousands of hours of training in advanced law enforcement. He has successfully completed the FBI National Academy in Quantico, VA.



Layperson of the Year: Mary Elizabeth Bell Nominated by the Kiwanis Club of Martin

Mary is 89 years young and is an active member of the Martin Kiwanis Club. She is a retired teacher who taught at Martin Primary and Martin Elementary School for 20 years. She co-authored a science textbook that was utilized by the University of Tennessee at Martin where she received her MS degree in education. After retirement, she taught kids how to sew at UT-Martin for 7 summers in the 4-H Round-up. She has taught Sunday school for 48 years and is very involved in her church. She organized the Girls Auxiliary Club and is very active in the American Cancer Society.

Teacher of the Year: David Bellard

Nominated by the Kiwanis Club of St. Bernard-Arabi

David teaches at Chalmette High School where he was awarded Teacher of the Year for 2022-2023. Over the last 9 years he has guided and assisted 24 students in earning full scholarships valued on average at \$250,000 each to some of the most prestigious schools in the country. YOUR District Foundation has been quite busy this 1st Quarter of 2023-2024! Since awarding grants during the 2023

District Convention (DCON), Clubs around the District have been able to send school supplies, uniforms and hygiene kits, coats to kids and install 1 AED in a school and 1 AED in a senior center! Over \$16,500 has been reimbursed to clubs since October 1st... and we're just getting started!

What wish do you have for your club? Check out the **Grant applications on our District Website** and keep dreaming! Community Service Grants: "GOLD" level grants (up to \$5,000) has 2 funding cycles: **February 1st** and **July 1st**. "SILVER" level grants (up to \$2,000) are awarded monthly until funding is depleted. **NEW** Clubs during their first 2 years of charter, have a \$1,000 grant available to them for a community service project. The "SUPER GRANT" (\$10,000) deadline to apply is **June 1st**, awarded during DCON 2024.





NEW CLUB grants: Here's the time line for the following new clubs to <u>apply</u> for their grants (then they have 1 full year to complete the project!): Tri-Parishes (2/8/24), Rayne (3/10/2024), Leesville (9/30/24), Red River Parish (10/13/24), NW St. Tammany Parish (5/25/25), Central (8/17/25), Tipton County (9/13/25)

Something new . . . SLP GRANT PROGRAM: Growing the K Family. Gov. John is encouraging Kiwanis Clubs to sponsor Service Leadership Programs (SLP). YOUR Foundation has established a grant to reimburse Kiwanis Clubs that sponsor NEW SLPs up to 75% of the cost to charter these clubs in the elementary, middle, high school and college/university.

How does the Foundation get the funds for these grants? Annual Club Gifts are a HUGE part of those funds, together with baskets the clubs donate for Gift Basket Raffles at Mid-Year Education Conferences and District Conventions. Yes, all those funds and items donated stay RIGHT HERE in the LaMissTenn District to support our clubs. Thank you for your support!

Kudos to the following Kiwanis Clubs for receiving grants: 1. East St. Mary provided uniforms and hygiene kits to all elementary schools in East St. Mary Parish, 2. Alexandria provided funds for school supplies at Rugg Elementary, and 3. Ponchatoula provided a free jacket to every fifth grader at Martha Vinyard Elementary.

Preparations for Key Leader North

In January, we will begin to prepare for Kiwanis Key Leader North which happens at Lakeshore Camp and Retreat on April 26-28, 2025. The registration will be open at, www.wtnkeyleader.org in January, 2024, so that both students and chaperones can begin to register for this year's event. Three new chaperones have already been recruited. If you would like to serve as a chaperone, there is no cost involved, except for getting a Kiwanis background check which is \$25, and it is good for two years.

We have already received funding for 12 scholarships for our event in the spring. The LaMissTenn District Foundation has provided 8 scholarships of \$250 each, and an individual who wishes to remain anonymous has provided 4 additional scholarships of \$250, for a grand total of \$3,000 to start the year off. We are extremely grateful for these donations. If you know of any students who would like to re-



ceive a scholarship or a sponsorship, please encourage them to contact me.


There are ten positions for Student Facilitators which will also open in January. Any student who has attended Key Leader before is eligible for one of these positions. If a student hasn't attended, but has acquired some leadership skills doing something else like Student Council or serving as an officer in a

club, etc., he/she is also eligible for this position. Student Facilitators will need to come to Lakeshore Camp and Retreat early on Friday to be trained by the Lead Facilitator so they will be prepared to assist with the curriculum through the weekend. The cost to attend for a Student Facilitator is \$150, but these students are also eligible for scholarships or sponsorships.

Regular student participants can be any student, whether they are in Key Club or not, who is 14-18 years of age or is in the 8th grade going into the 9th grade, or currently in the 9th through 12th grade in high school. The cost to attend for a regular participant is \$250; however, most, if not all, will receive a scholarship or sponsorship to attend.

Germantown Celebrates 60 Years



CHRISTMAS PROGRAM

The Kiwanis Club of Baton Rouge Early Risers has been engaged in several community projects this year. Our most recent project was held on December 16 in honor of one of our longtime members, William M. Lockhart who was a prominent member of the Chaney-ville community. We hosted a Christmas program of fellowship and caroling followed by the serving of dinners for over a hundred senior citizens of the community. Several members were present to provide holiday cheer.

SCHOOL GARDEN

The Club partnered with Cooper Farms and My Kid Plate Foundation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, to bring healthy foods to communities with limited resources and access. The



mission is to increase access to nutritious foods by creating nutrition educational programs for low socioeconomic communities.

The school garden was originally established with elementary school students participating in the Science, Writing and Agriculture (SWAG) summer program at Southern University Laboratory School. The students, with assistance from the Early Risers, maintain and harvest the garden during the summer. Through this activity, the students learn the importance of eating healthy foods, participate in the Science, Writing and Agriculture summer program and develop lead-

ership skills. This is the first time many of the students have seen vegetables growing. The Club has received a grant from the Kiwanis Children Fund for the "Southern University Laboratory Garden Expansion."

KIWANIS ONE DAY

For our Kiwanis Day of Service, Early Risers partnered with LSU Kiwanis and the Baton Rouge Council on Human Relations to provide much needed supplies to the Capitol Area Alliance for Homeless. The day shelter serves hundreds of clients each week providing showers, laundry, shelter, and many other services. Michelle White, the executive director, and Pam Wall, board chair, were very helpful and able to give us a generous list of needed supplies. We provided over \$700 in hygiene bags, laundry products, underwear, and body lotion. We also collected dozens of t-shirts and socks. With such abundance we were also able to help the men's shelter for St. Vincent de Paul.





Dyersburg Helps Goodfellows Program

This year's Goodfellows was a true community operation. The Kiwanis Club of Dyersburg worked with the whole county to improve our area, 350 households at a time.

PHOTOGRAPHS: If you're shooting a service project, look for an action photo of the volunteers in progress or interacting with children. Shoot from the front – we are not likely to use a shot with mostly backs. Use as high a resolution as possible. Captions may not always be published, but it is helpful if you can identify subjects.
