Happy Kiwanis New Year!

Happy LaMissTenn Kiwanis New Year,

I am excited to get off to a tremendous new Kiwanis year as your 2054-2026 Governor with the other leaders of your district. Governor-Elect Andrew, Vice Governor Laura, and I are working as a team to ensure we are on the same page.

We have all been through a lot with our club since COVID in 2020, but the future growth of LaMissTenn is now and into the future.

At your district convention, I launched the theme for the 2025-26 year: "If you don't ASK, then you don't GET". Additionally, I aim to conclude the year with 4,000 members in our district. I asked Past Governor John Fry to be my District Membership Chair, and he accepted, so I appreciate him stepping up. At DCON, John and I met with the PDO Board and Past Governors to seek their support, and we received a positive response. They expressed a desire to see LaMissTenn return to its former state, and while we acknowledge it won't happen overnight, we recognize the need to start now. Also, you have heard the question "How do you eat an elephant? Well, one bite at a time, and that's the same way we need to build our district, one new member at a time.

Another goal is to open 4 or 5 new clubs in the district. The 1st one will be in Bastrop, LA, the week of October 19, 2025. If you are in the area and would like to



help, please let me know or contact the district office.

Remember, every new member we bring into Kiwanis means we can help more kids in your community. So, please help me and your club.

I'm asking you 1st to do your part by joining me, Andrew, Laura, your Trustees, and Lieutenant Governors in the 2025-2026 year. If you need help, please reach out to any one of us.

I want to express my thanks to those who supported me, as I am honored and humbled to serve as your 2025-2026 Vice Governor. My platform is MEMBERSHIP.

We need more hands on deck to serve as many children as possible. When you are out in your community, at work, or with family and friends, talk about how much FUN we have in Kiwanis, because all of those people are your prospective members. Share your passion and love for Kiwanis.

Ask questions such as: What do you know about Kiwanis? Have you ever heard of Key Club? What do you think about Kiwanis helping children in the community? Can you please tell me more about yourself? Listen carefully to responses of those you come in contact with. In fact, LISTEN more than you talk. Everyone knows more about himself/herself than anything else on the planet, so let the prospect do

ities, career information.

Invite your prospect to a fundraiser, a service project, your meeting, for coffee, or for lunch. Once there, LISTEN to them. When your prospect is talking, lean in, make eye contact, smile, nod your head, and you may want to even take notes. Your body language will let your prospect know you are genuinely interested in what is said.

Point out the VALUE that the prospect offers Kiwanis. Let him/ her know you recognize characteristics that your club needs. Say something like, "You are exactly that special someone we need in our club!" Use the information given to you while he/she spoke. Be specific and explain why.

Keep in mind, it may take more than one attempt to get your contact to become a Kiwanian. Notice I said "BECOME A KIWANIAN" not "JOIN KIWANIS." Once you have the prospect hooked, simply hand them an application and a pen, and say, "This is how you become a Kiwanian. It only takes a couple of minutes to complete this application." As the new recruit completes the application, it is important to remain silent, so not to disrupt his/her train of thought.

When the application is completed, let him/her know that Kiwanis is a dues-based organization, and that dues may be paid with cash, check, or credit card.

I look forward to hearing your success stories of building our GREAT and HISTORIC LAMIS-STENN DISTRICT! Thank you, thank you, thank you for all that you do for Kiwanis.

Endowment Awards Presented

Endowment awards were presented by Tom Long, Foundation President, during the Fellowship Luncheon at DCON.

In 2008, the District Foundation Board of Directors established a goal to create an endowment of \$500,000 by the year 2013. This goal was achieved in 2014. The principal of the fund will remain untouched to continue to earn the highest amount of interest/

dividends possible. The endowment provides around \$30,000 per year for funding the Foundation's Grants & Scholarship Programs. The endowment doubles the Foundation's income sources and allows the District to assist more Kiwanis Clubs with extra funds to complete worthy projects every year.

To help add to the Districts Endowment Fund, four endowment awards are available for purchase.

They are: the River of Life Fellowship (\$750), the Henry W. Nash~Eugene J. Maier Tablet of Honor (\$1,000), John T. Roberts Fellowship (\$500) and the Charles H. Ford Legacy (\$1,000). 
- With your club's participation in the Annual Club Gift with a minimum investment of \$5 per member, your club is eligible for up to \$5,000 in assistance with your club projects.

I also want to remind you about the Children's Fund grant programs for 2025-26. The Club Grant Program will continue again this year. There will be two cycles. For the March 1st funding cycle, your club must submit a letter of inquiry any time before November 1st and if approved, your club must submit a full application by January 1st. For the August 1st funding cycle, the letter of inquiry must be summitted any time before April 1st and the full application must be submitted by June 1st. The popular Microgrants program will also continue again this year. These grants are for Clubs with 35 or fewer members and are in good standing with Kiwanis International and the Kiwanis

Children's Fund. Clubs may apply for grants between \$250 and \$1,000. Your project must be a service project enhancing the lives of young children and youth in community; support a least one of the three Kiwanis causes: health and nutrition, education and literacy and youth leadership development; be upcoming or in process (not yet completed) when grant payment is received. The advantages of the Micro grants are: shorter application, less funding requirement required from other sources, a shorter decision period and faster distribution of funds. Kiwanis Key Leader Update

I know that some of you have heard me mention that the Kiwanis Key Leader Curriculum is changing. I attended the Key Leader Workshop in Pittsburgh, PA., at the Kiwanis International Convention, where they began rolling out the new program. It is still very much a living document and changes are still being implemented at this time. They piloted the program at two Key Leader Event locations last spring, and have implemented changes.

On September 10th, I was involved in the monthly Key Leader Meetings on Zoom where changes in the curriculum are being explained, what's being left in and what's changing are being introduced, and the program outline is being altered somewhat. KI staff told us that the handbook isn't finished, and they aren't sure that it will be ready by October for the events this fall. They are still welcoming our input. The monthly meetings will happen each month throughout the 2025-2026 year.

The major components are changing from Integrity to Leadership; Personal Growth to Growth Mindset; Respect to Meaningful Connections; Community to Global Citizenship; Excellence to Effective Communication. The importance of neighborhoods has been brought back into the program. Some of the notes I made about what is staying the same are activities: Leader grams (instead of Key Leader Grams), Smores, Bonfire, and Ropes Course.

However, they are making concessions for areas that don't have access to ropes courses. The cost will be \$7000 with a \$2000 deposit being due to Kiwanis International prior to the event.

Supplies for KI and from our district are pretty much the same. They are offering ideas to assist with student recruitment. I shared some thoughts with them about some of the ways that I recruit students. They are looking at developing postcards and business cards which can be distributed at Kiwanis conventions and meetings.

Student Facilitator training can be done virtually ahead of time, but it can also be done on site as well. We are being asked to send the email addresses of our Student Facilitators when they are identified so that KI can be in touch with them about the virtual training. KI is going to provide a survey for District Chairs concerning what worked and what didn't work.

Some changes that are proposed for the weekend outline of events are that Registration and check-in be moved to 3-5pm instead of 4-6pm. Do away with the 2pm student facilitator meeting; however, on-site training can still happen. Sometimes we've done it during dinner time when students were unable to make it in time for the 2pm session or it could be partially done during registration. At 5pm, there would be a welcoming session where neighborhoods, mailboxes, etc. are established

and set up. Then dinner would occur at 6pm followed by the curriculum continuing after dinner at 7pm. The schedule on Saturday and Sunday is pretty much the same, except that the ropes course goes from 1-5pm instead of 1:30-5:30pm, and then there's a short session before going to dinner at 6pm. Sunday's schedule is the same.

I have heard that they are taking the Larry video out which has been a very inspirational part of the program, but I do understand that it is an older video. I hope that they can find another example of someone who is close to the role model that Larry has been for so many years.

It's a pledge he says in every elementary school across the parish every year. As chairman of the Rewards for Reading program at the Kiwanis of Metairie **Dawn Busters**, the 77-year-old retiree finishes every presentation with those words.

After 18 years, the program now touches 56 schools, and Dussel has presided over it since the beginning. It's sponsored by Metairie's Kiwanis Club, which has "Dawn Busters" as part of the name because of their early morning meeting time and the e a rly morning r a dio show "Dawnbusters with Henry Dupre."

The club's Rewards for Reading program was created to help kids learn to read, and improving literacy has become a focus of policymakers since the pandemic.

As of May, 23% of Louisiana third graders scored "well-below" target reading levels on an end-of-year assessment, an improvement from 27% in 2024. And a new state law requires students to pass the



state reading test before advancing to fourth grade.

A car full of prizes

Here's how Rewards for Reading aims to solve the problem: A child reads a book, and takes a test on it. For each test they pass, they get a ticket that goes into a prize drawing. Then, twice a year, Dussel brings a car full of prizes — including Walmart gift cards, gift certificates for food or games and other donated items — to all 56 elementary schools in Jefferson Parish for the children who entered the drawing. The boy and girl who read the most books are rewarded with bikes. Over the years, the program has

given away between \$18 million and \$20 million in prizes.

Julie Broussard, a former Jefferson Parish school system librarian, saw firsthand how the program motivated kids to read. She had to start arriving to school 30 minutes early so kids could go to the library to check out books. Now, as the Bridgewater Elementary School principal and as a Jefferson Parish parent herself, Broussard sees how the program continues to get children excited about reading.

"Some students haven't had experiences with literacy and literature in their homes, so school is their first experience with just fun reads," Broussard said. "It just became something that was a fun incentive, but just built this culture of reading in the school."

Dussel boasts that the reading program's participation throughout the years is 99%.

'You gotta do this'

The bike giveaway is the highlight of the Rewards for Reading program, and it has been since Dussel visited his first school, A.C. Alexander in Kenner.

That first year, Dussel had two bikes with him, but he planned to give away only one. He picked two names out of 600 kids, and by happenstance both children had parents

who had died within the past 6 months. Dussel gave away both bikes — and found his calling.

"To me, the man upstairs said 'Hey Mel, you gotta do this," Dussel said.

At that point in 2009, the program was in 14 schools. But 10 years later it was in every school in the parish.

"I got to know the principals and librarians, and they said 'Mr. Mel, what you're doing is great, but you're coming to a school where you got 500 kids. They're waiting to see you and, 10 minutes later, you go on, and you give away two bikes and 498 kids are upset because they read a book and they didn't win anything," Dussel said. "So I started going out and getting sponsors."

Now, every child can get a prize, Dussel said. Cici's Pizza gives the program 30,000 certificates a year; Adventure Quest Lazer Tag in Elmwood provides 30,000 free games; Game on Social Hub in Kenner supplies 30,000 certificates and different prizes for the top boy and girl readers.

The impact of rewarding children for reading, instead of punishing them, goes a long way, Broussard said.

As a parent, Broussard notices her own children are more excited about reading for fun. They've even been asking to go to the library consistently this summer, she said.

Dussel makes this magic happen at the Rewards for Reading presentations, a school-wide assembly where Dussel gives away prizes to the entire school. With mascots and more, the presentations are carefully designed to entertain and excite children. When Dussel first started as chairman for the program, the presentations lasted 3 minutes. Now, they're as long as 45 minutes to an hour.

"Everything that we say in front of these kids has been carefully thought of. I got them jumping up and down, I get them screaming, I get them dancing ... You know, their attention span is roughly three minutes," Dussel said. "So every three minutes I'm changing things." Dussel says he dedicates at least two and a half months a year to this program, planning the presentations, gathering sponsors and visiting every school. But he isn't traveling alone. His fellow volunteers from the Dawn Busters Kiwanis Club take a month and a half off of "everything they do in life" for this program.

But the results make the sacrifice worth it for Dussel and the Dawn Busters Kiwanis Club, he said.

"It's our job, as adults," Dussel said. "These are our kids and the future of Jefferson Parish depends on what these kids do as they grow up. And if they can't read, they can't succeed."

Kiwanis of St Bernard-Arabi is stepping up to support the children of St Bernard Parish in getting "Ready for Reading" (RFR).
