Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving, a holiday celebrating gratitude, has a fascinating history that traces back to America's founding. The story begins with the Pilgrims, English settlers who arrived at Plymouth Rock in 1620. Facing a harsh winter and unfamiliar terrain, the Pilgrims formed alliances with Native American Wampanoag Tribe. The first Thanksgiving, taking place in 1621, was a communal feast shared by the Pilgrims and Wampanoag, celebrating their successful harvest and cooperation. While their menu vastly differs from today's extravagance, the essence of coming together in gratitude remains a central theme. Through the years Thanksgiving has evolved, but it wasn't until 1863 that President Abraham Lincoln officially declared it a National Holiday, setting its date as the fourth Thursday of November. The Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, a beloved tradition began in the 1920s and has become a staple of the holiday for many Americans. In essence, Thanksgiving's roots lie in its tale of survival, cooperation, and gratitude. Understanding the historical context of this Holiday enriches our appreciation for the traditions we celebrate today, reminding us that the spirit of Thanksgiving goes beyond the table and extends to the shared history that unites us.

 - o A letter of recommendation from an individual you find inspiring

Planning a Productive Club Meeting

One of the most important things for your Home Club to do is to host Club meetings often. How your Officers plan the meeting will help to determine how productive the meeting will be for the members. In order to help you out, I will be sharing my best tips for planning good meetings.

The most important thing is to make an agenda for every meeting. Even if it is just an Officer meeting, there should be an agenda made. Agendas help to ensure that everything is discussed before the conclusion of your meeting, and the agenda will help to guide you with what to talk about. It is also great for your Officers to provide members with an agenda so they know what to expect and ask questions about. The agendas can be printed out, sent to your members' emails, or posted in a communication group chat like Google Classroom. When creating your agenda, make sure you design it to where it is simple to read, has legible fonts, and contains colors that are easy to read. The simpler, the better.

My next tip is to make a presentation to project for the Club members to see. If members have something to look at, they often are more likely to pay attention. If you are discussing a service project that your club has done before and will be doing again, display pictures from the previous event. This will allow club members to have an insight as to what they will actually be doing at each event. With the presentations, still make sure they are easy to read and understand.

My next tip is to have an Officer meeting before the actual Club meeting. Officer meetings are a great time to decide who will be speaking about what, what the details are for each service project, and what the officers are expected to do at these service projects. When it comes to Club meetings, it is always great to have more than one Officer leading a meeting. It will allow for the members to hear from more than just one or two people.

My final tip is to include both fun and informational elements to your meetings. Club meetings are a great time to have small service projects, open discussions, and bonding games. More potential Key Clubbers will be interested in joining if they feel that the environment is welcoming. If members have suggestions for the next meeting, they could fill out a form at the end of the meeting for the Officers to take into consideration. By hearing feedback from members, the Officers and Faculty Advisors can make meetings more inclusive. I hope you found all of these tips helpful!

Setting SMART Goals
