CREATE YOUR CLUB'S MEMBERSHIP PLAN FOR 2024-2025

The MNDAK membership numbers are in and we lost 194 members in 2023-2024. There are several reasons given for the members stepping away from Kiwanis. Attendance, lack of time, and health reasons are among the top reasons, along with dues increases and an aging membership, continue to be our clubs' major issues.

The strongest Kiwanis clubs don't grow by luck or magic — they make membership growth a continuing part of club culture. Of course, it's great to have members who invite individuals they know or meet, but consistent growth requires actively seeking people as a club. We spend a lot of our club meetings looking into how we can serve the children of our community and it's time to make membership one of those topics at each meeting.

Ask your club members these seven questions:

- -What kind of club do we really want?
- -Is there enough "Kiwanis" in your club?
- -What makes us different from other community organizations in your town?
- -Do the people in your community know about your club?

- -Does your club have a plan to increase membership?
- -Could your club use a boost?
- -Does your club have a social Media site?

We are asking each club to create a membership plan with a goal to acquire and retain members. Download the "Create your club's membership plan" worksheet at https://tinyurl.com/238f2bas and ask your club officers to dedicate one meeting to discuss your plan.

- Set a new member growth number for the coming year.
- How many members do you anticipate losing this year?
- Has your club asked the membership to complete a Club Excellence (ACE) survey?
- What best describes your club's style for recruiting new members?
- What community involvement opportunities exist to promote membership?
- Have you used Two For Two as a tool to increase club membership
- Has your club recruited any corporate members in the past year?
- Do you have a membership committee?
- What recruitment tactic is best for your club? Explore the list of tools and strategies and determine what will work best for your club. See Resources Below.

Ask your club's membership to get involved with Kiwanis International training and membership forums. Once you have created a plan, share the accomplishments with us. I am willing to help with promotion and social media ads once your club has a vision of what you want to become.

MINNESOTA DAKOTAS KIWANIS EDUCATION FOUNDATION

Seasons come and go so quickly it seems. Meteorological fall will be over at the end of November, soon to be followed by Christmas.

At the end of the year if you are a graduating high school senior you are starting to get serious about what the future holds after graduation.

Many graduating high school seniors are anticipating some type of post-secondary education, and the costs associated with it. As Kiwanians we are in a position to perhaps alleviate some concerns of costs if students apply for and receive a scholarship from our district's Education Foundation.

Most Minnesota Dakotas Kiwanians know the Foundation each year awards about 55 scholarships to deserving students who attend a post-secondary institution during the following academic year. These scholarships are usually around \$700 per year, with many clubs adding funds to bring the total award to \$1000. While that amount is only a portion of a year's total cost it does help to reduce the impact of the total.

The Foundation awards funds only from the earnings of the corpus meaning that any donated amounts to the corpus are kept in perpetuity to provide help to students far

into the future. I suggest that Kiwanis members consider a donation to the Foundation in a loved one's name as a Christmas gift. A gift of this type is, in a sense, a gift that keeps on giving.

The Foundation has created several recognitions for those gifts reaching qualifying levels. For example, the Vantine Life Fellowship is given for gifts of \$100. The named person receives a plaque indicating being named as a Vantine Fellow and is listed on the Foundation's honor roll.

So maybe think outside the box and make a gift to the Foundation for Christmas. It would be a gift that wouldn't be returned!
