I'm looking forward to seeing you all there!




#### We Need Club Coaches!

### Message From Your MNDAK Educational Foundation

July is upon us and in another 6 to 8 weeks, children and young adults will be heading off to school and college. Speaking of college students, our District Educational Foundation recently awarded over fifty \$750 scholarships. This is fantastic. What a wonderful way to assist students in furthering their education.

If your club has a student from your community receiving a scholarship from the foundation, invite your recipient & parents to come to a Kiwanis meeting to share with your members, their college plans and course of study. We have had this practice in my club for several years, as our Harvey Club has three designated annual scholarships through the Foundation. This could be their parents' first exposure to a Kiwanis club and could be your next new member.

In addition, there could be a Circle K club at the college the student attends. Expose them to Kiwanis early, after all, they did receive a Kiwanis Educational Foundation scholarship, and they may be a future member in a club anywhere in the world during or after college. Just one seed of knowledge/exposure may plant roots for a future in Kiwanis.... Even Kiwanis leadership may be in their future.

Also, clubs only have three months left in this fiscal year to become a member of the "Century Club" by contributing \$100 to the Minnesota-Dakota's Foundation. Many clubs make this an annual investment. There is also the Vantine Life Fellowship of \$100 or a Joseph E. Messer Fellowship of \$500 which can be a personal donation or club donation to recognize a member.

The update for our District Giving for April 30, 2025, is showing a total of \$35,253.00

## Eighth-graders get realworld taste of job hunt

Eighth-graders, many dressed in ties, sport coats, dresses and polished shoes, filled folding chairs throughout the Litchfield Middle School gymnasium last week — with nerves, resumés and portfolios in hand.

For many, it was the first time they'd sat across from a potential "employer." And for all of them, it was the culmination of months of preparation for a special career-readiness program called Who Gets the Job? — a collaborative project between the school's FACS department and the Litchfield Kiwanis Club.

"It's a simulated exercise to help them understand what it takes to go through the whole job application and interview process," said Leland Fredman, a Kiwanis member who helped bring the project to life. "They've been working on cover letters, resumes, interview practice — even learning how to dress professionally."

The format mirrored a real-life hiring experience: students applied for a job in one of 14 different career areas. After morning group interviews led by local business and community leaders, two finalists from each group were called back for afternoon one-on-one interview. By day's end, one "candidate" was selected for each job — and announced during a closing awards ceremony in front of the entire eighth-grade class.

"They are taking it so seriously," said FACS teacher Laura Hulterstrum. "They've been anxious and excited, and I've seen them practice at home, rehearse with high school mentors, even ask me things like, 'Does this outfit look professional?"

Who Gets the Job is the revival of a program that last took place about a decade ago.

Judy Hulterstrum, a longtime Kiwanian and former Litchfield Chamber of Commerce executive director, teamed up with Fredman and Laura Hulterstrum, her daughter, to bring it back with a fresh, community-driven approach. The Litchfield Kiwanis Club secured grant funding from the Kiwanis Children's Fund and other sources to help purchase portfolios for each student, which held their polished application materials.

"We wanted to create a real-world experience that these kids will remember and carry with them," Judy Hulterstrum said. "We've even heard from parents of high schoolers who say, 'I wish my kid could have done this.'"

The project also tapped into support from the Litchfield Chamber of Commerce, Meeker County Economic Development, and various local employers — many of whom sent representatives to act as interviewers.

Alex Carlson, chairman of Litchfield School Board and general manager of Anderson Chemical's INTEGRA program, was one of the interview leaders. So were Meeker County EDA Director Lisa Graphenteen and Tom Zens, market president at Center National Bank, and Tim Cook, a Kiwanian and agent at Premier Real Estate Services.

Each was tasked with choosing just one of the eight to 10 students they interviewed.

"It's not easy," Fredman said. "These kids are prepared. They've practiced and they're ready."

Part of the eighth-graders' preparation included mentorship from Litchfield High School seniors, who visited classrooms earlier in the week to conduct mock interviews and share practical advice.

"They were phenomenal role models," Laura Hulterstrum said. "They gave great feedback, and some students even started using that language with each other — helping each other improve their answers."

While the competition aspect was real — only 14 students "get the job" — the educational value extends to every participant.

"This is a real-life test," Laura Hulterstrum said. "We call this (FACS) class Life 101. They're not just learning interview skills. They're learning how to reflect, how to accept feedback, how to handle disappointment, and how to thank those who help them along the way."

Reflection will be an important component, Hulterstrum said. Students will complete assignments after the event, thinking about their preparation, performance, and what they learned. Hulterstrum said she also planned to have them handwritten thankyou notes to interviewers and community partners.

The 14 students "who got the job" will be recognized at a May 7 Kiwanis lunch meeting, where they may be offered job shadowing or workplace tours aligned with their chosen careers.

"Some of the kids that went through this years ago got to watch surgeries, be on the

radio, or shadow a sports announcer," Judy Hulterstrum recalled. "It really stuck with them."

That's exactly the point, Fredman said.

"Our goal is for these students to walk into their first real job interview — maybe a year or two from now — and say, 'I've done this before. I know what to expect.'"

It was more than just a class project. It was a glimpse into their future — and a step toward it.

"They really rose to the occasion," Laura Hulterstrum said. "And I'm just so proud of what they accomplished."
