The 2025 Kite Flying at Camp Chance was held on July 8th with 45 1st and 2nd graders attending. The second event was held on July 15th with 55 3rd and 4th graders attending.

North Suburban Kiwanis Malt Shop Success!



For 56 years, the North Suburban Kiwanis Club has operated a malt shop at the

Minnesota State Fair, which runs 12 days ending on Labor Day every summer (with notable exceptions, including 2020). This is the club's primary fundraiser and requires a great deal of human power to be successful!

This year the club was successful in recruiting over 90 volunteers to fill 225 shifts throughout the fair. Volunteers served approximately 25,000 chocolate, vanilla, and strawberry malts to State Fair attendees from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m daily.

Every single club member volunteered for at least one shift, with some members taking on multiple shifts a day. All money raised goes back to the Kiwanis Club and thus back into the community, to support service projects and other causes that make the world and our community a better place.

Circle K International Update



Dear Minnesota -Dakotas Kiwanis Leadership,

My name is Carly Brundies, and I currently serve as the 2025-26 Minnesota Dakotas CKI District Governor. As we celebrate

78 years of outstanding service, leadership, and fellowship through Circle K International, I wanted to reach out with some updates regarding our recent accomplishments on both the district and international level.

First, from an international perspective, I'm proud to report that CKI is **thriving** in terms of recruitment and retention! As we close out the 2024-25 administrative year, our organization has processed **30** charters as of September 24th, with ~10 more pending charters on the way. In total, this will bring us to over **40+** new charters for the service year - the highest we've seen since **2017**. This highlights **life** behind CKI, as our growth and success is *only just beginning*.

As a direct complement to the new charters, we are now up to **6187** dues-paid members and **314** clubs as of September 24th, placing us neck and neck with our numbers from last year. As of right now, we are projecting a final 2024-25 membership number close to ~6,300 upon processing payments from the current pending charters. This would mark an **increase** in overall membership compared to the year prior.

Despite facing several prior years of membership decline and being in the middle of a three-year 83% dues increase, one thing remains clear - CKI remains strong, CKI remains active, and CKI is on a trajectory to success. Regardless of the challenge, our leaders remain resilient, working hard to help CKI shine bright. The CKI International Board has laid the groundwork for improvement, and together - all our clubs and districts are now focusing (and succeeding) in both membership growth and retention.

Next, in terms of bridging the gap between CKI and Key Club, we have been working closely with the CKI International Board to capture more Key Club alumni. Following outreach by the CKI International Board to over ~650 Key Club alumni that indicated interest in CKI, our District Board has been hard at work following up with each potential member. Whether by connecting these students to already existing CKI clubs on their home campuses or offering guidance and resources for the chartering process, our district is dedicated towards further enhancing our relationship with Key Club.

Amidst all of these successes, I wanted to take a moment to **thank you** for Kiwanis' continued support of CKI. These accomplishments are not CKI's to celebrate alone, but instead serve as a reflection of **our** shared commitment and effort towards inspiring students towards our tenets of service, leadership, and fellowship.

Our CKI young adults are looking forward to continuing years of Kiwanis service in their respective Kiwanis chapters throughout their lives. In the summer of 2024, at the University of Dakota State in South Dakota, they started a summer charter, which is sponsored by the Madison Kiwanis Club!

They have done an extraordinary 360 hours of service in only 15 months!!

For my self-directed Symbol Communication Board Governors' Project, I have been able to build connections with the City of Mankato Parks and Recreation Department, along with spreading awareness for equal access to play and communication at my college campus.

Having this opportunity included on my resume for graduate school applications shows my communication, time management, organization, and community building skills. I can highlight my personal values outside of CKI and show how it all ties back to the support Kiwanis gives students like me.

Looking forward, the 2025-26 CKI International Board has set the goals of achieving 6750 dues-paid members, 325 dues-paid clubs, 33 new club charters, and 15 club reactivations. Together with my District Board and the rest of the International Council, I am **confident** in our ability to not only achieve but *surpass* each of these goals.

As we get ready for the start of the new administrative year, I would like to reiterate - the support and investment that we have received from Kiwanis is **fundamental** to each of the successes we have already seen and will continue to be the foundation for our growth. Don't forget - CKI has the highest service hour/member rate across all of the Kiwanis Family, and we intend on building on this in the new administrative year.

As a District Governor, I am passionate about continuing to connect our organizations together and hope you feel the same. When CKI thrives, Kiwanis shines, and I invite you to **join us** in this journey

towards continued success - one club, one member, and one leader at a time.
