A Message from the Secretary Treasurer

Happy Thanksgiving! As I'm entering my 4th year in this position as your Secretary Treasurer, I just must tell you all how much I have enjoyed working with all of you. It's my pleasure to assist you all as you do your work for the Children of the Minnesota-Dakotas District. There have been a lot of changes over the last year with reporting and resources that are available so don't hesitate to contact me.

Case in point, the new Engage reporting system went live last July with some new wrinkles that have caused some questions and frustrations. Here are some we are running into:

- 1. If you are a club secretary and have not been able to access the reporting dashboard, it's most likely because you are not being recognized as the secretary and therefore do not have access. Contact me, and I will add you so that you can get in and do your reports.
- 2. All club officers now have access to Engage so will need to create their account and profile in Engage to access the club information. That's new, in the past only the secretary could do reports or make changes.
- 3. If you are a club officer, you must have your phone number and email in your profile or you cannot be added as an officer for the club.

4. Some people got a shock when they signed in after Oct 1 and all of last year's reports, that were supposed to have been brought over, weren't there. They are there, the system defaults to the current year so you need to change it to show 2024-25. They were worried because annual reports are due this month.

I do deal with more than Engage, but it seems these are the calls I'm getting right now. Talk to you next month!
