President's Letter

My Fellow Easton Kiwanians,

August was a spectacular month to be a Kiwanian. I hope you all find ways to lean into what we accomplish as a club and find ways to participate. Joining existing committees and becoming involved with Service Projects as they arise are the best ways. We always look forward to hearing new ideas from our members on how we can be even more effective in serving the children and communities here in Easton and the surrounding area.

Highlights for our Club this month started off with National Night Out on August 1st at the Paxinosa Elementary School in Easton where we are also hoping to start a K-Kids program for students. It was great to fly the Kiwanis Banner and interact with people of the community as we told them about Kiwanis and handed out children's reading books. It was especially gratifying as we had brought copies of the Early Learning Guides, especially focused on families with young children, which we were able to selectively distribute to those who came to our table and had young children. This turned out to be a fantastic way to get these Early Learning Guides into the hands of mothers and families that may not have another chance of seeing this great material, focused on the raising and education of infants through Pre-K children.

We also had the opportunity to attend the Pennsylvania District Convention in Scranton. We had 7 members of our Club in attendance. It is always a wonderful experience attending the conventions as we meet fellow Kiwanians from around our state who share a vision of helping children and the communities where they live. It is always uplifting and energizing learning about what other people are doing for Kiwanis and bringing home ideas we might apply here in our area. This year was particularly meaningful as we had the opportunity to celebrate the Kiwanis career and retirement of Kevin Thomas, the PA District Executive Director. Kevin has served the PA District for over 37 years, and we wish him a bright and rewarding future as he turns the page to a new chapter in his life. The Kiwanis Club of Easton, along with a matching gift from the Easton Kiwanis Foundation, made a \$2,000 gift in Kevin Thomas' honor to purchase Early Learning Guides for distribution throughout the PA District.

Another highlight of the month was the EMS of the Year presentation on August 16th. We had the opportunity to honor a bright young woman and Lafayette University student who spends a great deal of time volunteering at the Easton EMS. This is the second instance of our club honoring first responders in our community. We had our annual Police Officer of the Year in May, EMS of the Year this month and Fire Fighter of the Year will occur on October 18th.

September will bring more great opportunities to serve and spread the good word about Kiwanis. He explained that the Kiwanis Club of Easton began EMT of the Year Award a year ago. He then introduced E. Buddy Shull, Emergency Squad President, who explained the process for selecting EMT of the Year.

Buddy said that Rachel was highly recommended for this honor. She is a student at Lafayette College. She was a Bio-Tech student before becoming an EMT but changed her major to medicine after her EMS experience. She was president of the EMS Club at Lafayette her freshman year and was EMT certified in Massachusetts. She then transferred that certification to Pennsylvania.

James Owen presented the award to Rachel and she was asked to say a few words. She thanked the Kiwanis Club of Easton not only for the award but for the service the club does for the community. She is from Massachusetts but said Easton has become her second home since she has been here for two years. She also said that being an EMT has enabled her to develop a connection to the community.

August 23rd Meeting

Today's meeting was held at SURV Restaurant with 17 members in attendance and one guest, Charles Chase. After opening exercises led by President James Owen Barb Walters shared words of inspiration. James then introduced our speaker, Susan Bartels, CEO of Big Brothers, Big Sisters of the Lehigh Valley.

Susan has been an advocate of Big Brothers Big Sisters for over 30 years. She had a little sister in college. She explained that Big Brothers Big Sisters matches a child with a caring mentor to help develop the potential of that child. She said that there are 12 staff members, 5 programs and 376 children served by Big Brothers Big Sisters in the Lehigh Valley. She also said that 90% of those being served have been diagnosed with a mental health condition, developmental diagnosis or have experienced trauma. Mentoring is 1 to 1, focused on the mentee, structured and supported to help develop the child's potential. She also explained what it is not

Susan said that high school students can also be mentors to the Littles. This provides a good experience for those high school students that might be interested in teaching or similar fields. They are also able to get scholarships.

Because so many boys are in need of a Big Brother the program **Sports Buddies** was created. This program connects Bigs and Littles through shared participation in sports and physical activities. This takes place once a month for 9 months.

Another program is **Big Futures** which prepares young people for tomorrow's workplace. It does this through career workshops, resume writing, communication skills and financial literacy. There is also a 1 on 1 mentoring session with the youth to tell them about certain careers.

They also are providing training sessions for parents of the youth who are in the program and the age of youth has been raised to 21. There was a question-and-answer period following. Thanks to Susan Bartels for such an interesting and informative program and for all of the services the Big Brother Big Sister Program brings to the youth of the Lehigh Valley.

INTERVIEW WITH CHRISTOPHER PALTZ, BBA, MBA, CPA







Chris, tell us: As a retired individual, how did you start helping at The Salvation Army Easton Corps?

I started, on my own initiative, by volunteering to drive the food van picking up food from local companies for the needy of Easton. For three years, myself and my sidekick Charlie, would head out at 9:30 a.m. four days a week to pick up food donated by many local firms. This took us from store truck-loading docks to store and restaurant entrances and back to headquarters by 11:30 a.m. The van was unloaded in time for the food distribution that starts at 1:00 p.m. I would, as time permitted, stick around and personally hand out food to those in need.

Off the record, how do you commingle with the needy of The Salvation Army?

That's easy—I too am needy and I fit right in. My need is to help, and their needs are to be helped. A great match! I feel so privileged, on occasions, to eat at the soup kitchen with fellow men and women of need and just have a plain conversation and spread joy & humor whenever appropriate.

Is there any way else you helped?

Yes. For years I participated in the Christmas Red Kettle Bell Ringing effort. I really did not mind the cold winter elements when ringing bells outside. I would stay warm by smiling, ringing the bell, helping children place money in the kettle and wishing everyone a Merry Christmas! For one Christmas season, I partook in counting kettle money at the bank.

Chris, you're on the Advisory Board also?

Yes! I use, for one, my financial expertise as a Certified Public Accountant to aid in interpreting many financial and operating aspects of the organization.

Tell us more!

Let's not forget the all-important religious aspect of The Salvation Army. Captains Daniel and Isabel Mino devote much of their time to the spiritual outreach to the community as ordained ministers. Bible Study and Sunday Services give Daniel & Isabel tremendous satisfaction, and in turn, inspiration to the community. Stop by some Sunday at 11:00 a.m. to join in the religious service and meet some of the nicest people. The congregation meeting after services is a joyous event too!

Chris... time has run out. Can you leave us with a parting thought?

Yes, I remember so vividly the time when I was standing by the front entrance of the headquarters and an elderly gentlemen approached me. He was clothed in rags, unshaven, hair to his shoulders and he smiled, with few teeth, and said "I need food." It was a privilege to hold the door open for him as I welcomed him to the Easton Corps of The Salvation Army. We then proceeded to feed and clothe him—a most gratifying experience, I assure you!!
