August 7th Meeting

Janet Owen opened the meeting today by leading the club is saying the *Pledge of Allegiance* and singing *God Bless America*. Barb Walters shared words of wisdom. Janet then turned the meeting over to our speaker Paul Werrell who introduced himself and the topic for the program....The Impact Project: Community Justice Panel



Paul is a consultant to the Community Justice Panel. He provided us some history on the program and explained what it is and who it helps and supports. The Community Justice Panel (CJP) Program is a youth aid panel diversion program designed to utilize trained community volunteers to effectively handle first-time, juvenile offenders charged with summary and misdemeanor offenses. Community volunteers uphold Balanced and Restorative Justice Principals. The offender and family meet with the panel of volunteers to discuss the crime, school, and home/life issues. The goals of the program are accomplished through the panel's creation of a contract for the youth to complete. Successful completion results in no adjudication of delinquency and in most cases, the dismissal of fines and court-related costs. If the youth does not complete the contract they are processed through the traditional court system. The panel is not a court of law and does not determine guilt or innocence. Guilt is admitted by the juvenile prior to accepting the CJP as an alternative to the traditional court system. At any time during the panel process, the youth or their parents may end the process and choose to go to the District Justice or Juvenile Court.

The youthful offenders eligible for the panel must be first-time offenders guilty of a summary or misdemeanor offense. And are referred to the panel by the local police department or the District Justice at their discretion.

Paul shared the goals and benefits for the program and handed out a Community Justice Panel Questionnaire that are used to apply to become a Panel member. Currently there are 13 panels throughout the Lehigh Valley located in: Emmaus, Whitehall, Allentown (2 panels), Southern Lehigh (2 panels), Fountain Hill, Bethlehem, Salisbury, Macungie, Lower Macungie, Slatington and South Whitehall. Northampton County is slated to have a Panel up and running in the near future.

Easton Emergency Person of the Year Award 2023 Honoring Kyle R. Sherman



On August 14, 2024, the Kiwanis Club of Easton had the distinct honor to posthumously recognize the recipient of the 2023 Easton Emergency Person of the Year, Kyle R. Sherman. President James Owen opened the meeting. The *Pledge of Allegiance* was said and *God Bless America* was sung. Barbara Walters shared words of inspiration.

James then welcomed our guests, Linda Sherman, Kyle Sherman's wife, and his daughters, Kelly Mihalko and Tracey Mazzarella and Christina Henritzy (Operations Manager of the Easton Emergency Squad) and Bud Shull, President of the Board of Directors of the Easton Emergency Squad.

Walt Howell, a member of the Kiwanis Club of Easton and chair of the Awards Committee, gave remarks about the history of the Emergency Person of the Year Award followed by Bud Shull who spoke about the honoree.

First Bud thanked the Kiwanis Club of Easton for acknowledging the Easton Emergency Medical Services as part of the Public Safety Trilogy. He went on to say that service and dedication were two words that described Kyle Sherman as well as going above and beyond as an EMS practitioner.

Kyle Sherman began as an EMT in Williams Township where he served as Captain and as President. He and his family lived next door and his family became involved and spent countless hours volunteering there.

When the Easton Emergency Squad began advanced life support service Kyle and his family also volunteered there. He was also on the board and president. He volunteered all of this time while working at ArcelorMittal, formerly Bethlehem Steel. He facilitated the merger between the Williams Township and Easton Squads. Even after his retirement he remained on the board and as an EMT.

Kyle Sherman was a wonderful example of dedication and service and Bud Shull said, "the void left by his death remains unfilled."

The award presentation of a plaque in Kyle Sherman's honor was made by James Owen and Bud Shull and received by Mrs. Kyle Sherman. Remarks were made in Kyle's honor. Also, the Kiwanis Club of Easton gave a bouquet of flowers to Mrs. Sherman presented by Janet Owen recognizing the importance of her support of husband as a first responder.

Our thanks go to Mrs. Sherman, her daughters, Christina Henritzy and Bud Shull. It was truly an honor to recognize your husband, father and colleague Kyle R. Sherman. He left a remarkable legacy.

 points of interest from the convention.




During the weekend there were several motivating Keynote Speakers, general sessions and a wide variety of Break Out Forum sessions as well as times to socialize.
